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In giving this opimion to Captain Gordon, we were guided by an anxious wish that no act of His Majesty's Commissioners, aeising out of the visit and search of French vessels, should ereate discussions between Great Britain and France, that might affeet the harmony which now subsists between the two Governments. It appeared to us, that if our decision was favourable in this cuec, the Commanders of His Majesty's ships would most likely guide themselves, in future, by that decision, to mmke experimental seizures under the white flag. The ontus of such proceeding would, therefore, rest upon us ; which proceeding, not being pursuant to the Treaties and Aet of Parliament, under whieh we have had the honour to be appointed, we could not justity,
. Paiutul as it was to us, my Lord, to sce the flag of France covering such an infamons transaction, we conceived, in addition to our foregoing opinion, that our duty would not allow us to interfere in this matter, bearing in mind the insiruction of the late Mr. Canning to His Majesty's Commissioners, dated Jume 2, 1823, not to consider those clauses in the Treaty, which contain general declarations of illegal participation in slave transactions, as grounds of condemnation of ships or eargoes, ostensibly belonging to other Powers, not parties to such Treaties.
If, my Lord, in this mprecedented care in the Courts of Mixed Commission, we have erred in the line of duty we have pursued, we bave, most humbly, to solicit your Lardship's indalgence.
Captain Gordon having satisfied himself, by the assertions of some of the crew of "Le Mamucl"" who had, after lier loss, shipped on board "La Lenve't in the River Shebar, that the 120 slaves were Spanish property, tetermined to take the responsibility upou himself of landing those slaves:Ile accordingly did so, on the 12thi instant, und placed them under the care of the Colonial Government, to await instructions from His Majesty's Government, how they are to be dealt with. The deposition of 3 sailors, taken before a Magistrate here, positively makes these slaves to be Spanish property, In an instruction from the late Mr. Canning to His Majestys Commissioners, dated the 17 th of November 1823, they were reminded, that, in taking upon themselves the power of dolivering over slaves for emaneipation, in cases which are not properly cases of forlciture, they could be justified only by very special circumstances, and the sanction of Gavernment, ou a statement of thic particular facts $t$ we, therefore, most respeetfally beg your Lordship will Monour us with instructions, whether the British and Spanish Court of Mixed Commission can go to the adjudication of those slaves, and pronounce them a lognl capture.

Having landed the slaves in question, it was Captain Gordon's intention to proced with "La Laure" to Goree, to deliver her up to the Freneh Authoritics there. For this purpuse, His Majesty's ship "Atholl" and "La Laare" got under weigh, and were standing out of the harbour, when some of the crow of the latter informed Captain Gordon, that she was, bound fide, a Spanish vessel; the papers of which nation were thrown over-board, during the time the "Atholl" chased her. Both shipt, therefore, returned to the anchorage, and upon Captain Gordon's declanation, "La Laurc" was almitted, on the 13 th instant, into the British and Spanish Court of Mixed Commission, to be proceeded against for a breach of the 'Treaty. On the morning of the 16th, His Majesty's ship "Atholl" left this ; and in the afternoon of the same day, a pectition, to the following effect, was prosented to
the Court :-

The circumstance of the Proctor's inability to substantiate the allegation of her being a Spanish vessel, appeared to the Court to be just grounds for granting the prayer of his pectition, and, aceordingly, the Acting Registrar was directed to deliver to lim "La Laure's" ship's papers, and to stay
further penceedings.

Immediately it was known, that "La Laure" had been withdrawn out of the British and Spanish Court of Mixed Commission, she was seized by thre Ordnance Store-keeper, (Mr. Birch), who conceived himself authorized to do sis, under the Act 5 th Geo. IV. cap. 113, sce. 43.

The Collector of the Customs also seized her.
Mr. Birch has sinee beco obliged, we understand, from his not bearing His Majesty's commission, to relinquibh his seizure. The Colleetor is therefore prosecuting her in the Vice-Admiralty Court of this Colony.
We have been thus mirute in detailing to your Lordship the eireumstances regarding " La Laure," as they successively occurred, that the whole of the fiects, relating to that vessel sinee her deteotion, may, at one view, be presented to your Lordship's notice. We have, de.

## Mr Lokd, Sierra Leome, Jamurny 5, 1830.

WE have the honour to transmit, enelosed, a general list of all the eases, adjudicated in the several Courts of Mixed Commission, established bere for the repression of the illicit traffick in slaves, in the year 1829.
By this list your Lordship will perecive, that 23 vessels were condemned, and that 4.777 slaves were emancipated in that period. 156 eases have been adjudicated, and 20,588 slaves emancipated, in tho several Courts, frow their establishment up to the present date. 672 slaves having been landed, by Captains Owen and Aratin, at Fernando Po, in 1828, as per list return; and Captain Owerr having limded there 34 shaves, out of the Netherland schooner " fivondelfe," and 127 slaves ont of the Brazilian schooner " Meusegeive," in the past year, logethor with 4 having died alfer emancipation, but betore registration; making a collective number of 837 ; only 20,051 have beeni registered in this colony.

## My Lobi,

Sierra Leore, March 22, 1830.
THE number of lamented deaths, which eccurred amongst the British Members of the Mixed Commissions, stationed in this colony, during the last awful rainy season, from an epidemic fover, induees an anxiety, on my part, to obtain your Lordshipis sanction to quit this place, during the fatal months of Junc, July, and August.

It is now ascertained, that that epidemic arose, not from any eabse in the colony, but had its origin in a large tract of swampy, uncultivated land on the continent opposite thereto, and in its immediate vicinity ; thus rendering it extremely probable, that each succeeding rainy season may bring on similar disastrous results.

I have, therefore, most respectfully to solicit your Lordship's favourable consideration of my request, that your Lordship will be pleased to grant mo conditional permission to leave this colony during the aforesaid months, in the present, and in each ensuing, year, should my medical adviser urge the danger of remaining here.

His Arajesty's Cammissioners to the Earlof Aberdecn.-(Rectiveld.Aug. 17.)

## My Lord,

Sierva Letonc, June 15, 1830.
A REPORT lias, within these last 2 days, reached this colony, upon unquestionable authority, that there are, at the present momeut, no less than 2 vessels, undor the French flag, in the Rio Nunez, and 6 vesols, some under French, and some umider Spanish, flags, in the Rio Pongos, slaving in those rivers.
At the time the person, who brought this intelligenee, left the former river, (about 10 days ago) the 2 vessels, slaving therein, were shipping their eargoch, and our informant anticipates that, by the present time, the vessels in question have cither sailed, or are ready to do so.
It is with great regret we submit this report to your Lordship, as the vicinity of these rivers to this must be extremely prejudicial to the commereg of the British trader, who resorts thither for the purchase of hides, ivory, wax, and palm-oil:-and we lament to state that, whilst the natives are excited by slave-dealers to turnish them with a human eargo, those natives are so infatuated with that trade, and with the large profics they thereby obtain, that no inducement, that will allow of profit to purties offering it, will tempt them to turn their attention to the procuration of such articles, as the British trader can lawfully purchase.-In ardition to this, the greater the number of slavers in those rivers, the greater the demand for nice and palm-ail, for the food of the slaves ; and as slavers also purchase ivory, the three staple articles of the produce of thove rivess thas become monopolized by the illicit traffickers, us the natives will ever give the preference, in the sale of thoso articles of lawful commeree, to parties who purehase their slaves.
Captain Webb, of His Majenty's ship "Medins," during the time that ship was lying here, in the begraning of last month, dispateled 2 bouts to the Rio Pongos, for the purpose of examining that river. After an ahsence of some days, they returned, liaving found only a vessels therein-one Freneh, evidently slaving, and 1 American; a Spanish schooncr had left a few days previous to that visit, with a full eargo of slaves, which vessel it was the particular object of Captain Webb to detiin.
It is evident that the slave-trade is considerably increasing in those rivers, as 4 resels hast arrived in the Rio Pongos, for thie purpose of slaving, within the short space of 3 weeks, that being the elaped time, between the yisit of the boats of His Majesty's ship "Medina," and our informants. leaving that niver.
The activity which is displayed by slavers, in the bights of Benin and Biafra, engrosses so mach of the attention of His Majosty's squadron there, in order to suppress the illicit traffick, that the coast and rivers about Sierra Leone mast, unavoidably, at times, be left open to the influence and operationk of the slave-dealer.

We are, therefore, of opinion, that if a small vessel, a cutter or a schooner, commissioned by the Lards of the Admiralty, and furmishad with the becessary instructions, under the command of a Lientename of His Majesty's navy, but subject to the direction of the Governor of this colouy, conld, consistuntly with the Treaties between Great Britain and Foreigu Powers for the repression of thie slave-trade, be stationed here, the difierent reports which, from time to time, reach this colany, might be adrantagoously acted upon, and the slave-trado in the above named rivers, and at the Galmas, where it continues to be unrenrittingly carrind on, would, we confidently antieipate, be greatly reduced. Sueh raduction would be effected by the vessel, so commissicned, either eaproring ships with slaves on board, or by ervating such fear in the delinquent parties, from her being constantly in the neighbourhood, as would deter them from venturing, in such numbers at lenst as they now do, to carry on that traffick.

## 8 Sierra Leone. (General.)

The present system pursued to suppress the slave-trade, so long as Great Britain continues to be the ouly Power, zcalously endeavouring to effeet that humane measure, will, wo apprehend, never accomplish that mueh desired object. Slavers are continually making sacecssful voyages, and returning to the same places for fresh cargoes: thus, whilst this system is continued, and it does not appear possible, under existing circumstances, materially to alter it, the natives of Africa will not believe, that the slave-trade can ever be repressed, and eagerly seek the opportunity to sell their fellow man. By success in this pursuit, they easily obtain their luxuries and comforts,-consequently will not exert themselves in cultivating the natural products of their country, which require manual labour, a labour, which, unfortunately, an African will avoid by every means, short of starvation; the slave-trade to him, being an easy source of profit, requiring no labour, is, as such, an easy souree of pleasure also.

Whilst such habits continne to predominate in the African, and so long as his prejudices are fastered, and comforts and luxuries supplied to him by slase-dea'ers, we cannot but think, that the abolition of the slave-trade, and the consequent civilization of Africa, are measures, which afford little hope of ultimate suecess.

I IIAVE caused communication to be made to the Admiralty, from time to time, of the several despatches, which I have received from yoil, respecting the movements of vessels, suspected to be intended for illegal slave-trate.
The Lords of the Admiralty have stated to me, that it is hardly possible, that information of this nature can be sent from henee to the Africas squadron, in time to be of any use; and their Lordships have suggested, that the Commissioners should be directed to endeavour to convey, whenever any direct opportunity may offer, such intelligence, addressed to any of His Majesty's Officers on the other side of the Atlantic.

It appears to me to be probable, that sueh a conrse would be attended with benefit to the service, on which you are engaged; and I have, therefore, to direct, that you will comply with the suggestion, which has been thrown out by the Admiralty.

## My Lond, <br> Sierra Leone, July 13, 1830. <br> WE have the honour to report to your Lordship the following circum-

 atances, relatiog to the cass of a wesof, hanined thic "Nossz Senhara do Givier," seized in this harbour on the sth ult., by the Collector of Customs, for being fitted out and equipged, in this colony, ior the slave-trate, contrary to the Act of the 5th Giso. IV. cap. 113; and which said vesel was condemned in the Vice Adminalty Court, establitied lierce, on the 30th ult.The " Aossa Sechherct da Giaiw," originally a Brazilian vessel, was captured by the "Dallat," a tonder to His Majesty's + hip "Sy bille," for baing engaged in the illicit tratick in slaves, having then ou boaril a cargo of negroes; and sho was condemned, by the Brirish aad Braxilian Court of Mixed Commassion, as lawfol prize to the Crowus. of Great Britainand Brazil, on the 13th of May last, as reponted to your Lordidip in our despatch, marked Brazils, of the isth of that month.

The "Nassa Senhora dn Guia" was accordingly sold by publick auction, and was purchased by Mr. Thomas Harrison Parker, late one of the Commissioners of Appraisement and Sale to the Courts of Mixed Commissions.

Previously, however, to Mr. Barber, the present Commissioner of Appraisement and Sale, completing the bill of sale of this vessel, Mr. Parker requested, that, as he had purchased the vessel for a Spaniard, named Salvador Lorens, the bill of sale might be made out in the name of the latter person, for whose account Mr. Parker said he had actually bought her. A copy of Mr. Barber's letter of explanation on this subject, we beg to enclose.

The bill of sale was, thercfore, made out in Salvador Lorens' name; that person immediately took posscssion of the "Nossa Senhora da Guia," and, considering the conversion of the property complete, displayed the Spanish tlag on board of her

Mr. Parker alsopurchosed, at publick auction, for the same Salvador Lorens, many leageps and other casks, which had been taken out of vessels condemned in the Counts of Mised Commissions; and thesc leagers, and other casks, were shipped on board the " Nossa Senhora da Guia."

It now beeomes necessary for us to acquaint your Lordship, that Salvador Lorens belonged to the Spanish schooner "Mariadelu Conception," which vessel was captured by His Majesty's slip "Primrose," in the Rio Pongos, with 79 slaves on board, on the 24th of March last, and condeuned, in the British and Spanish Court of Mixed Commission, on the following 11thof May. The charaeter, therefore, of that man, the shipment of so large a number of water-casks, together with its being publiekly known, that he had but lutely returned to this: colony from the Galinas, as notorious a place for Spaniards to carry on the slave-trade as Whydah, ou the leeward coast, is for Brazilians to carry on that traffick, naturally raised strong suspicions of the object to which he was about to apply the "Nossa Serihora da Guia."

These suspicions were further heighténed by reports, which have at times reached thir colony, thit several vessels, that had been sold under decrees of the Courts of Mixed Corpotissions, and purchased by foreigners, had been, immediately after quitting thris, employed in the slave-trade. The capture of 1 vessel, under such circamstances, the Portuguese Brig "Hasse," condemned on the 24 th of June 1829, afforded proof that those reports were not totally unfounded.

The Collector, therefore, closely watebed Salvador Lorens' actions, allowed him to complete his preparations, and eleared out the "Nassa Scuhora dat Ginia" for Cuba, on the ath ult., but early on the morning of the next day, and just before she was about to leave this port, the Collector went on board. and, after a strict search, found she had on board nearly 4,500 gallons of fresh water, with casks capable of containing 1,200 more, and concealed in the run, someslave leg and neek irons, and chains. The Collector thereupon scized the "Nossa Senhora da Givia," and prosecuted her to condembation, in the Vice Admiralty Court, mades the sths section of the " Act to amend and consolidate the laws relating to the abolition of the slave-trade."
It is with regret we aequaint your Lordship, that amongst the British subjeets in this colony-a colony specially formed for the suppression of the slave-trade-men were readily found, who, unblushingly, and with the greatest effrontery, stept forward to advocate and defent the cause of the "Nussia Senhara da Grian," notwithstanding the very suspicions character of her Owner and Master, Salvador Lorens, and the actual proofs against her. The Advocate who condueted the Claimants care, in his anxious desire to exeulpate these unlawfut procedings, endeavoured to criminate the Officers of the Courts of Mixed Commissions, by charging them with having left the slaveirons on board of the " Nossia Senhora de Guia." This charge was, however, most satisfactorily met and rebutted, npon oath, by the Marshal to the British and Brazilian Court of Mixed Coumission (Mr. Lake), whom the Claimant in his defence prodnced as a witness to prove that particular point. Salvador Lorens, after he was brought to this colony in the "Mirnir ife la Comecption," left that vessel to her fate, and made the best of his way to the Galinis. At the Galinas he obtained, froma Spaniard, of the mame of Pedro Blanco, a notorious slave-dealer there, an order on Mr. Parker for 1,000 dol-

The order in question was accepted by Mr . Parker, and the amount was applied by him to purehase, for Salvador Lorens, the "Nossa Senhurn de Cria,"" nod the casks, \&e. found on board of her; and for which agency he has charged Salvador Lorens 10 per cent. commission.
The Lieutenant-Governor judged it proper, under these circumstances, immediately to remove Mr. Parker from the office of joint Stipendiary Potice Magistrate, which sitaation he had held for about 12 months past.
The King's Advocate has ulso liad Mr. Parker examined on the charge, which he (the King's Advocate) has, er officio, brought against him, under the 10th section of the Act of the sth Geo, IV, cap. 1i3, for being an agent, employed in accomplishing objects and coutracts, which have been therein declared unlawful; and Mr. Parker is now at large, on bail to neet the indietment, which, on the above grounds, the King's Adrocate will prefir agaiust him at the next ensuing Quarter Sessions of Oyer and Terminer. YOUR despatch of the 15th of Mav, on the mortality stated to occur among the slaves of captured vessels, on their passage to Sierra Leone, was communicated to the Admiralty; and I have now to transmit to you, for your information, the accompanying copy of the answer, which has been returned to that communteation, stating, that directions have been given to the Officers commanding ships, making captures of slave-vessels with a large number of alaves on beard, to send, whenever it may be practicable, a metieal man in such vessels to Sierra Leone. 1 am, ke. His Majesty's Conmuissioners to the Earl of Alberdeen.-(Reccived Dea. 16.)

## My Lord,

Sierra Leome, September 21, 1830.
IN making our report to your Lordship, upon the state of the slave-trade in the vicinity of thix colony, under date of the 15 th of June last, we drew your Lordslip's atteotion to some facts connected therewith, which this despatch, we think, will illustrate and confirm.

No diminution in the traffick in slaves, within the sphere of our own personal oberration, has taken place; and painful as it will probably be to His Majesty's Government, and to the friends of the African race, to leara that fict, we most again state to your Lordslipp our convietion, that that traffick is cousiderably fiercasing. In this immelinte neighbourhood, the slave-trade is now carried on to an unpewcodented estent, unter the flags of Franes and Spain; and it is a prevailing opinion here, that that tralle would be increased to an inconcrivable degree, if the Courts of Mixed Commissions wera not placed so near the secne of such slaver's iniquitous transartions; which operates, in some measure, as a check upon them.
Notwithstanding Brazil has declared the earrying on of the slave-trade, by her subjects, to be piracy, we have information, that Brazilian vonets are continuing, in deflanes thereof, that ualawfol connerce. In proof of which, we beg to subioin the following extruet from a letter, written from the Rio Nunes by a British merchant, addressed to a pentlenaan here, who has purmilted us to ase the satne, for your Lordship's informations.
" Rio Nunez, August 28, 1 s30.
" Weare cot op in both rivers (Pongos and Nuncz) with slavers, French, Spanish, and Brazilian, which materially imjures our trade. I hope the new Commodore (Captain Hayes) will remedy this."

We have requested to be intormed of the names of, and other circumstariecs relating to, the vessels so engaged, particularly Brazilian ; and if we can be fermished thencwith, we shafl immedrately transmit the information whinined to your Lardhhip.

The injury to the Britsli trader, which is spoken of in the extract from the letter, which we have gived, arises from the canses with which we have powionsly sequainted your Lordship, viz. the unfortunate influtuation of the African in finow of the slave-trate, and so long is that trade is continued in places whicre the British merchant resoris for legitsmate commerce, he will aluays be " cut np" by the slaver.
The Gatinas to the southward of this colony, has often been ruportad to your Lordship as a most motorious, us well as a productive, slave port. It atill maintains, undiminibibed, that charneter. Many vessels, principally Spaniards, are reported to us to he therc, th the present time, awaiting eargoes of slaves ; and we apprchend, from the want of a ervizer on this part of the coast, they will saceerd in safely efferting their objeet.

shelier under the lee of the Bannanas, where they remained some days, untit the boisterous weather nbated, and then returned to their original anchorage.
The Master of one of the said vessels went on shore at the Bunnanay, and saw the Manager of the liberated Africans stationed on those islands, (Mr. Frederie Campbell) to whom he openly confessed the nature and object of his slaving-boynge; that his 3 consorts were similarly engoged; and that they alt espected, very shortly, to get their slaves from the River Sherbro', (nea; which river the Plaintain Islands are situated) as they had each contracted with the uutives thereof for their cargoes.
The sume person also informed Mr. Camplell, that 25 vessels were fitting out at Nantz when he left France, with the intention of parsoing the same trade in which he himself was cugaged.
Without placing reliance upon the latter part of the information thux obtuined, we think it will appear clear to your Lordship, that French vessels, or vessels protected by the flag of France, in great numbers, still eontinue the slave-trate; and we regret our inability to pnt your Lordship in possession of the names of the before-mentioned 4 vessels, emiplayed in that traffick, the names of their masters, or of the ports in France, or in her colonics, from whence they severally sailed; so that they might, strould it have mut your Lordship's appiroval, be denounced to the French Government. But of the fact, as we have stated it, we pledge ourselves to your Lordship.
It thus appears that slavers to the northward, and slavers to the southward, of this colony, contime to exercise unremitting and unceased exertions in their unlawful pursuits, - pursuits that, we fear, will still continue to elade the vigilance of the British Governmont.
We are much concerned to observe, that the boundary from this colony, outside of which the slave-trate lias, more or less, been constantly carried on, is becoming daily contracted in its cireumference. In the neighbourhood of Siern Leonc there are no cruizers,-it has no armed colonial vessel, -there is nothing to intimidate slavers from earrying on their trafifiek in all directions, close arount it. Tliat trade, in fact, is now maging on the very contines of this setilement, reviving those favourable feclings towards that demoralizing traffick, amongst the people of the surrounding ecomtries, which we had lioped had been effectually suppressed, by the liberal cucouragewent that has been given to them, by the British trader, to pursue other commerce than that of their fellow-creatures. The slave-trade is also spreading wide its bancful inflnence into the very heart of this. colony, and in progress of utterly destroying the little moral inftuence, that the Christian Keligion, after ycuis of labour, may have implanted in the liberated Afriem.

Four liberated Africans are now in gaol, to take their trial, at the next ensuing sessions, for selling some of their libenated brethren into slavery; an American settler, brought here in 18:7, by Paul Cuffee, is also in gail, to take his trial at the same time, for slave-trading.

The means to contront this growing evil, and to which we took the liberty of drawing your Lordship's attention, in our despatch, of the 13th of Juice last, stilt appear to us to be greatly called for,-that of stationing a small vessel of war always here, to be commanded by a Lieutenant of His Majesty's navy, but subjeet to the direction of the Governor of this Colouy, and duly furnished with the signed instructions, necording to the several Trenties for the repression of the slave-trade, by the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty.

Athough that measure would afford but a partial renedy, vet it is to be hoped that some good would result from it, in nt least restraining the very great extent, to which the slave-trade is now carried on in the vicinity of this colony.

We are of opinion that if the whole of the British squadron, now stationed on this const, were to pay its undivided attention to the rivers and places about Sierra Leone, the slave-trade therein could not be effectaally suppressed. Oat of the many vessels comployed in that tratfick, some would, doubthoss, eseape, and thus afford encouragement to other slavers to persevere, in hopes of being alike fortunate. But if the slavers were driven therefrom,

those slavers would readily change the seene of their operations, to the coast to lecward, in the Bights of Benin and Biafra, and, most probably, they would be as successful down there as they are now up here.
If we were to estimate the total number of slaves exported from the western coast of Africa, by the few vessels engaged in the illicit traffick, whieh have of late been captured, to the eastward of Cape Palmas, by the whole of His Majesty's squadron collectively, we should hazard the opinion, and we think justly, that the number of slaves exported from this part of Africa, say from Cape Palmas to Cape Roxo, is now fully as great as the number at present exported from the Bights of Benin and Biafra. Comparatively speaking, only a few Spanish vessels, engaged in the slave-trade, actually go to the latter places, the grenter number, by far, come for their cargoes to Bassa, Pequena Bassa, thic Galinas, Rio Nunez, Rio Pongos, and other places, all to the westward of Cape Palmas, and within 1 or 200 miles, either way, of this colony. It is no true criterion to judge of the actual destination of Spanish slave-vessels, becouse they clear out, from the Havans, and other ports of Cuba, For the islands of Princes and St. Thomas, for each vessel, uuder the Spanish flag, that has this year been captured off the Galinas, and the Rio Pongos, had cleared out for those islands. Ilis Majesty's Commissioner at the Havana, in 1829, reported to your Lordzhip, that "the Galinas is the most noted of all the slave-troding depots in Africa, and that Mandingo slaves are particularly esteemed." Mandingo slaves are only to be obtained to the northward of this colony; we think, therefore, that, from what we have now had the honour to lay before your Lordship, we are warranted in entertaining such opinion.

There would, then, appear at present, we regret to say, but little likelihiood of the slave-trade erer being completely suppressed, by the present restrictive measures, exployed to prevent that traffick, which are totally inadequate to effect so desirable an objeet.

To suppress the slave-trade, as at present carried on, with any degree of effect, a nasal force, sufficiently increased to allow of many fast-sailing vessels, to be constantly cruizing between the River Gambia and Cape Palmas, (which part of this coast is only visited at distant periods by a vessel of war, owing to the slave-trade in the Bights of Benin and Biafra, oceupying the attention of all the squadron) is, in our opimion, absolutely required. This, together with the consent of the Foreign Powers, who have entered into Treaties for the suppression of the slave-trade, but whose subjects still continue to carry on that traffick, to permit Great Britain to scize and condemn vessels under their flags, it found fitted und equipped for the slave-trade, ss sueh fitting and equipment can never be required for lawful commerec, would render the risk of loss, and cousequent ruin, so great to the unlawtul slave-trader, as would, we should bope, in a short time, most considerably diminish that traffick. The flag of France would then be the only resort of slave-traders to cover their nefarious transactions; and in that case, we trust, the French Government would concede to Great Britain, the right of search over vessels on this coast, bearing, her flag, and that, if found similarly circumstanced in earrying on the slave-trade, to the veasels of the other Foreign Powers, similar penalfics should ensuc.

The triends of humanity might then look forward with hope, to no very distant period, for the result of their arduous exertions being rewarded, by an extinetion of the unlawful exportation of Africans from their native commuy. Until, however, the alorenaid measures, or measures equally effectual, pic applied to put a stop to the slave-trade, we see no hope of its repression.

Extrats from the Regnlations, for the Guidance of the Commissions appointed for carrying into effect the Treaties for the Albotition of the
Slave-trade.

THESE Commisions are framed in pursuanes of the following Treaties betwern Ifis Britannick Majesti, and His Most Faillfal Mojerty the King of Portugal, His Catholick Menjesty the King of Sjuin, and His Majesty the King of the Netherlandit.
The Traty with Portugal mas made of the 28dh July 1617, and Ratifications were exchanged at Ria Jancito on the 27th Noveanler 1817.

The freaty with Spaia was made on the 23d September 1817, and Ratificitions eschanged at Mantrid on the 28 d November 1817.
The Treaty with the Kiag of the Neflimiands wan made the th May 1818, and Hatifinations exclanged at the Hajoe on the 25 hh May 181 A .
It any not, in the firat place, be injproper to wake a short review of these Treatien, as they rygand the illicit traffick in slaves.
Tha Treuties betweas this Country and Portural, and Spain, anil the Acs of Patiament for carrying thoxe Treatics firto effeck, divclare illicit, all trafick in slaves by Mritish slips -all triffiek in Phria by Portuguese of Spanish shipe is perts therein specified, and ail auch trafick in other paris, by Portaguese of Spanih ships, for account of the mbjieds of any_other Governuecte, or bound for aty port, not in the dominioss of the Savercign to which the ship may belong.
By the Treaty with the King of the Netherlanis, that Sovercign engages within 8 months, of woner tif possible, from the exchange of the Ratifiratinas, to puphibit all his saljerts, In the meat Aretral manner, and especinlly hy perat hew tho moit formal, to take any part whatever in the torle of alaves; and in the event of the menanes altendy taken by the Beitish Grotermment, and in In taken by that of the Neflestande, being found ineffectnal or insufficient, the High Contractimy Partion matnally cagage to adopt weh farther meisures, by leghi provition or otherwise, as may, frouitine to sime, appear best esfeulated to grevent all their Tespoctive sutjocts from taking any shinte whetexer thr this nefurious tiaficich.

## F'iscount Palmerston to His Mojesty's Conanissioners.

Gentlemien. Foreign Office, December 31, 1830 ,
YOUR desputebes up to those of the 30th of October, 1830, have been received.
I have communicated to the Board of Admiralty, your despatches of September 21 st , and October 18th, rquorting the increase of slave-trade in the neighbourhood of Sierra Leone, and suggesting, that a vessel of war, furnished with instructions under the Treaties, should be stationed at that place, and made subject to the orders of the Governor of that Settlement.
The Board of Admiralty have answered, that they cannot comply with this suggeation, as it is contrary to the custom of the serviec to place any of His Majesty's ships under a Colonial Goverament; but that strict orders are given to the senior Oilicer on the African station, for the prevention of the slavetrade, and the protection of the British settlements and commarce.

ENCLOSED we have the honour to transmit, for your Lordahip's information, our report of the case of the Spanish brig "Octovio," captured on the 9 th ultimo, in or about latitude $4^{*} 10 / \mathrm{N}$., longitude $7^{\prime} 90^{\prime} \mathrm{E}$. by His Majesty's brig "Clinker," Lieutenant George William Matson commanding, with 366 slaves on board, who had been sbipped, 2 days previously, in the River Bonny.
The illicit traffick in which the "Orfavia" was engaged was so manifest, that the Court, at its sitting, on the 19th iustant, condemned her as lawful prize to the Governments of Great Britain and Spain, and emaneipated ber surviving slaves, to the number of $335-31$ having died sinee capture.

The "Octavio" was armed with 8 carriage guns of a large ealibre, with a crew of 40 men, and was prepared for desperate resistance, but, happily, made none, as she was taken by surprize.

Lordship, the report of the ease of the Spanish bripuntine " Cristina," Joaquim Rodrigue, Master, captured, on the 11th of October last, in latitade $1^{\circ} 51^{\prime}$ N., longitude a: $51^{1}$ E., by His Majesty's brig "Black Joke" tender to- the "Sybille" ander the command of Licutenant Parrey; having on board 348 slaves, who had been shipped in the River Brass.
The " Cristiven," on her passage to Sierra Leone, streek on the Scarcies Bank, and almost immediately filled with water; but we are happy to say no lives were lost by the accident, the slaves having been landed by the assistance of the boats of an English merchant-ship, the "Sappho," then lying it the Seareies River. Immedately this circumstance was known here, a vessel, called the "Frederich," *as dispatched, by the Captor's Agent, for the slaves, which vessel returned, on the 15th Novenber, with 232 , the survivors of the number captared; all of whom, being in a very sickly state, were landed on the morning of the 17 th.
The illicit employment of the "Cristina" in the slave-trade having been fully proved, the Court pronotinced, that she was subject and liable to confiscation, as good and lawful prize to the Governments of Great Britain and Spain, and cmaneipated her surviving slaves, on the a 7 th instant.
The great mortality amongst the slaves of the "Cristina," from the period of her eapture to-thie day of her adjudication, arose from that terrible seourge the small-pox ; which breaking out amongst them, in a small vessel, crovrled together as they were, spread with rapidity through the whole number on boird, and earried off 116 previously to their arrival hure, and 16 atter they were lauded.

The "Frederick" arrieed in this hutbour late in the night of the 15th, wihh 232 shavea on bourd, 116 laving died on the passage to this port, from stall-pox. Eirly on the following morning, Mr. Boyle, the Surgron to the Count, procerded on board, and reporied, othat most of the people then remainitg appesed to have been nffected with smnil-pox, and were very mueh debilitited, that many had "Cnuw Cruw', and that about 10 wero uffected with ophthalaia; from all which dicumstunces, he reonmaended than to be lended as specdily as possible." They were, therefore, on the following moming, disetabarked at Kissy, and placed in the hospital there, under tive chnrge of the Colonial Ciovemment,
The monition, cithg ail parties interestex to appens, went forth on the 16 th , and was returnod, certified to hive been duly served, on the 2tth.

On the 18th and 19th, 2 scamen of the vessel, Gregorio Ferrandez and Migucl Heari, wete exurnined on the standiny imterrogatories. Thiry hoth swore, "that the present vayage began, and was to have ended, at the Havans, that the River Brass was the only plaee toxuched atduring the peraent rayage, and that all die slaves were miere taken on board."

I HAVE the honour to enclose, for your Lordship's information, the copy of a letter, which has been addressed to me by Mr. Robert Dougan, Agent to His Majesty's ships "Sybille," and "Primrose," together with a copy of the reply I returned to that gentleman.
From this correspondence, your Lordship will learn, that Captain Fraser was willing to distribute the slaves, captured on board the Spanish vessels, "Maria de la Conception" and "Mansanares," provided that measure met my concurrence, a concurrence I reatily gave, for the reasons assigned in my reply to Mr. Dougan.
Mr. Dongan has, since then, personally acquainted me, that the slaves taken on board the aforesaid vessels, umounting to about 420, have boen distributed in the mountain villages.

Twenty-four of the slaves died on the passage uf to this port; the grcater part of the remaining number, (225,) were, more or less, afllicted with the
small-pox.
The "Attiseara" was, therefore, ordered to proceed with them up the river to the village of Kissy, where they were landed, and placed in the Liberated African Horpital, at present established there, on the 25 th ultimo.

WITH our present despateh, we have the honour to enclose a report of the case of the schooner "Maria de la Conecrption," Santiago Comas, Master, sailing ander Spanish colours, and fornished with papers, obtained at Matanzas, in the Island of Cuba, but owned by Juan Fernaoder, of the Danish Istand
of St Thomas.
It appears by the ship's papers, that the "Maria de la Conception," after leaving Matanzas, went to Porto Kieo, and from thence to St. Thomas, from which later island she cleared out for Cape Verd, on the 4th of August, 1829. She, howerer, asiled direct fromi St. Thomas, for the Rio Pongos, and had shipped her slaves (who had been purchused for the account of the said Juan Fernatidez.) from a place called Bongolong, and had had them nu board 3 daya previous to her detention by the boats of Ilis Majesty's ship "Primrose," on the 24th of Morch.
Sentence of condemnation was, therefore, recorded against the " Marin de le "Conceptiong" and the 79 slaves taken on board, were deereed to be cmaneipated on the 11th instant. We have, de.

WE have the honour to enclose; herewith, for the information of your Lordship, our report of the case of the Spanish schooncr "A Acnazaares."

The "Mansanares" was commanded by Manoel Alcantara, and was owned by Francisco Muente, of the Havana, from which port she cleared out, for a mereantile voyage to the Island of St. Thomas, on the 27 th of August 1829.

On her voyage to the Coast of Africa, she put into the Cape de Verds to repair a leak, and from thence she went direct to Cupe Mount, where slie purelased 354 slaves; and was on her return to the Havana, when she was fallen in witls, on the 1st of April, in latitude $6.17^{\prime} \mathrm{N}$, longitude $14^{\circ} 13 \mathrm{~K}$. by His Majesty's brig "Black Joke," Acting Lieutenant Coyde, commanding, and, after a chase of 12 hours, was eaptured.

After the capture of the "Sfrmzamares," and before the confusion attendant thereon had subsided, the slaves ruse upon the captors, and 1 officer, whom they succeeded in getting down, (Mr. Lame, Assistant Surgeon) was seriously injured by them. They were, however, quelled, but not until several were very severely wounded, who are now in a favourable state of recovery.

A Court was held for the adjudication of the "Afanzawares," on the 11 th instant, when sentence of condemnation was pronounced upon her, as good and lawtul prize to the Crowns of Great Britain and Spain, and 349 slaves, $b$ laving died, were directed to be emancipated.

WE beg leare most respectfully to enclose, herewith, a report of the case of the Spanish schooner "Altimara," Pedro Sala, Master, owned in part by himself, and in part by other Spaniards, resident at the Havana, whose names he would not reveal.
The voyage, in which the "Attimara" was detained, began at St. Jago de Cuba, having obtained papers from the Goverument of that provinee, dated the 24th Octaber, 1829, and from thence she sailed direct to the River Brass, near Cape Formosa. Maving obtained a cargo of slaves in that river, she sailed therefrom on the 23d of March, and was detained, on the following 27th, by His Majesty's gun-brig "Clinker," Lieutenant Matton, comsmanding, in latitude $4^{\circ} 00^{\prime}$ N., longitude $5^{\circ} 00^{\prime} \mathrm{E}$, baving on board 249 slaves.
At the time of the detention of the "Alimarra,", the slaves were suffering from small-pos, and 32 died from that cause on the passago up. On her arrival here, the Surgeon to the Courts reported 3 fourtis to be suffering from that disease, and that tresh cases were still occurring. The survivors were, therefore, landed at Kissy, and precautions taken, by keeping them separate, to prevent the spread of that fatal discase among the inhabitants of the colony. 19. however, died from the period of their being landed, on the 25 th of April, (making a total of 51 deaths) up to the day of the adjudication of the ". Ah, timare, "which took place on the 11 hi instant, when she was condemined, ss good and lawfal prize to the Crowns of Great Britain and Spain, aud 198 slaves decreed to be emancipated.

The "Loreto" was on her way to the Havana, when she was fallen in with, and captured, on the 12 th instant, by His Majesty's brig "Plumper," Lieutenant John Adams, Commander, having on board 186 slaves, who had beenstipped from Little Bassa (a place about 200 miles to leeward of this colony), on the previous 9th of the month.
The "Loreto" had been some months obtaining her slaves, She sailed from the Havana on the voyage, in which she was taken, so long ago as the latter end of August last. Oa her way to the coast she fonebed at Port Praya (the capital of St. Jago, one of the Cape de Verd Islands), and from thence went direct to Bassa. Oif that place she was boarded by His Majesty's ship "Sparruw Hawk," on the 2sth of Dceember, then said to be procuring riee, and again by His Majesty's brig " Plumper," on the 17th of February, said to be slaving, as appears by the boarding Officer's endorsements on lier pmpers.

The original Master, D. Migel de la Vegi, to $u$ hom the vessel and carg ${ }^{0}$ is said to have belonged, died on the coast.

WE have the honour to enclose, herewith, for your Lordship's information, our report of the case of the Spanish schooner "Santiago," alias " $P_{0-}$ losqui," condemned this day, in the British and Spanish Court of Mised Commission, for illicitly trafficking in slaves.

The "Surtiogo" was commanded by Francisco de Paula Golget, formerly an American subject, born in the Floridas, but now owing allegiance to the King of Spain ; and was owned by Lorenzo Maso, of St Jago de Cuba, who fitted her out at that port, for the alleged purpose of a commercial voyage to the Island of Princes, like the generality of Spanish vessels, which are engaged in the illicit traffick in slaves.

The "Santiagn," having touehed at the Danish Island of St. Thomas, proceeded direct from thence to the River Bonny, and shippod, in that river, 165 slaves, She was on her return voyage with them, when she was fallen in with, and detained, on the 8 d instant, in latitude $3^{\circ} 41^{\prime} \mathrm{N}$., longitude $7^{\circ} 32^{\prime}$ E., by His Majesty's ship "Atholl," Alexander Gordon, Eeq., Captain.
The circumstanees attending the illicit traffick, in which the "Santiago" was engaged, call forth no particular remarks from us, to which we are desirous to call your Lordship's attention; but we think, that we should be compromising our duty, did we not point out to your Lordship, the removal, in this case, of a quantity of spirits, and some medieines, after capture, into the capturing ship.

Although the Prize-Officer, Mr. Henry Bernard, has, in an affidavit, accounted for the reason of their removal, still we think that such removal, together with the causes thereof, should be, by the Captor himself, notified to the Court, by certitying thereto, upon the survey of the stores of the vessel, that is now required to be held at the time of detention, rather than that sueh information should be obtained, in the first instance, from the witnesses produced in the cause.

## My Lond,

Sierra Leone, October 18, 1830.
WE have the honour to encloze to your Lordship, with this despatch, our report upon the case of the Spanish schooner ". Alafí Prima," Joze Maury, Master, which vessel was detaned, by His Majesty's ship "Medina," Edward Webb, Esq. Commander, of the $18 t h$ of August last, in latitude $3=22^{\circ} \mathrm{N}$, longitude o ${ }^{\circ} 16^{\circ}$ E., and sent here for adjudication, under the Treaty between Great Britain and Spain, for the suppression of the illicit traftick in slaves.

Captain Webb declared, that he detained the "Alafa Primo," for having on bourd 6 native Africans, detained in irons, as slaves, und, according to the depositions of the said Africans, they were stolen off Grand Bassa, about 10 days previous to captrre; and this was corroborated by Mr. Pearne, the Pizze Master of the "A Alafa Primo," who, in his report to the Court, on arrival in this harbour, on the Ath ultimo, stated " that he had 6 kroomen on board, who were ironed at the time of capture,"

The evidence adduced before the Court, however, elearly proved, that the said natives of Africa, by their own admission, were not in irous at the time of capture; that they were not slaves, butwent on board the "A Alufa Primo" at Grand Baysa, voluntarily, in their own canoc, to obtain employments, that the reason of their not recurning on shore, was in consequence of that canoe getting aecideatally adrift, and stormy weather preventing the lad left in charge of the canoe, from regaining the suid xeliooner, which vessel was, from the later cause, at the time the Africans boarded her, ebliged to stand off the land to prevent shipwreck.

Much matter was introduced into the evidence, to prove, that it was the intention of the Master of the " Atafa Primo," to coavert those Alricans imto slaves; and that, from the fitting and equipment of his vessel, such must be iuferred to have beea his ultimate ohject, as he had carried them far dowy the coast, from their own country, without attempting to land thew, and had had them, as they stated, confined ia irons. The Court was, however, of opinion, that that position was not horice out by the evidence, there being strong circumstances to believe, that the Claimant had offered to land them: which offer they refused, because war existed between them and the people who inhabired the spot, where they were offired to be landed; and hicir assertion, that they had been confined in irons was most dubious.
The intention ouly, of partice under the Spanish flag, to carry on the illicit traflick in slaves, the Court held, did not bring their vessel under the operation of the Treaty for its repression, as the fiting and equipment of a vessel would, alone, prove that intention; which, as the Treaty now exists, would not be sufficient grounds to coudemn such vesoel. The fact of having on board a slave, or slaves, acquired by the illicit tratick, or having had suels on board, brought there for the express purposc of the taffiek, simply, authorizad the Court to condemn the vessel and cargo, and emancipate such slaves as might have been found on board. In the case of the " deafa Prime" not the slightest proot of the illicit traffick in slaves was brought foriward: the Court, therefore, on the 6th instant, decrued the "Ateafe Primo" to bo restored to the Clamant, together with costs of suit, and such spocial damages and expenses, as he had incarred by the detention of bis visecl; and referred the same to the Registrar, to ascertain the amount thereol, and report the same to the Court.

The Registrar laving made his report, the Court, at ifs sitting, on the 16 ch instant, confirmed the same; (no objection thereto, cither on the part of the Claimant, or on the part of the Captor, laving been offered,) and thercupon decreed, that Edward Webb, Esq. the Captor in this case, should pay unto Joze Maury, the Claimant, or unto his lawfol attorney or attornies, for the use of the Owners and Proprietors of the said schooner "S Atafa Primo," abssolutely, and unconditionally, the sum of $\mathcal{L} 13.4155$. , which the Registrar stated, lie was of opimion the Claimant was entitled to, for the detention of lis vessel. A copy of the Registrar's report, end a copy of the decree foumuled thereon, we beg to enclose.
In respoctfully referring your Lordslip to our report of the case of the "Alafa Prime," (the evidence bearing thercon, and our reasons for coming to the conclusion we did, being therein fully set forch) we beg to draw your Loristip's attention to the fact, deposed by the Master, " that the "- itafa Prime "and cargo were insured for 24,000 dollars, by some persons residing at Kingatom, Jamaica ; which insurance had been effected through the agency of a M. Norris, of St. Jago de Cuba." We regret we were not able to elicit further information upon this point, so that we might have beea able to aequaint your Lordship with the names of the partics, who are thus stated to have fosured the "Atrafa Primo." For although thit vessel cleared out from St, Jago de Cubs, for legitimate trade, to Prinees Istand, which would, probably, afford a pretext to the parties in question, to defend their so doing: yet there cannot, in our humble opinion, exist the slightest moral doubt, that cevey Spanish vresel from Havana, or other ports of Cuba, bound to the Coast of Africa, is known to all parties enggged in her, to have in vies a slaving voyage,
We are anxious to obtain your Lerdship's instructions upon the following point :- had it been proved, that the Africans, who had voluntarily gone on board the "Altofa Primo," land been detained against their consent, would sucti tetention (fliey not having been acquired by an illicit tratick in slaves, nor brouglie on board for the express purpose of the traffick) have heen a sutficient justification to the Court, to hase pronounced sentence of condemnation upon that vessel, under the Treaty?

The 1st Article of the Treaty states, that it shall not be lawful for any of the subjects of the Crown of Spain to purclases slaves, of to carry on thic slavetrade, on any part of the Coast of Africa, upon any preteat, or in any manner
whatever；and the 9th and 10th Articles of the said Treaty，the 1st Article of the Instructions，and the Ist Artiele of the Regulations，attached thereto， uppear to us，expressly，to limit their operation to vessels found carrying on an allicit tralfick in slaves．

We entertain the opinion，and we state it with deference，that，under the Treaty，as it at present existe，the arbitrary detrmtion of Africans，not aequired by an illicit commerce or traffick，would be an act of aggression against such detained parties ；but we have strong doubts，whether the Tecaty is strietly applicable to cases of such nature．

We further beg，most rexpectfully，to draw your Lordship＇s nttention to the fact，that Spanish vessels have becn in the habit of robbing Brazilian vessels of slaves，a system which，we believe，Spanish vessels will still con－ tinne to carry on，where their force is sufficient to awe or overpower the weaker vessel．If，therefore，any Spanish vcssel，having slaves on board， obtainel by such means，were detained and sent bere for adjudication，would the British and Spanish Court of Mixed Commission be authorized in en－ tertaining the question？We beg to state our humble opinion，that the slaves that might，under those circumstanees，be on board，would not have been acquired by an illicit traffick in slaves，but would have been acquired by an act of piracy；and，thercfore，we think，the question would be for another Tribumal to decide．

It appears to us to be a matter of importance，to ascertain the view which His Majesty＇s Government may take of these two questions，and we，therefore， most humbly submit them，in order to obtain your Lordship＇s commands for our guidance，in the event of such cases coming before us for adjudication．

In Spanial eates, evidence of the intention of vessels, under the flag of that nation, to earry on the slave-trade, cannot be cntetainell lyy this Court as grownds of conderanation: atrd the cence of the "A Aafa Prinu" has been greaty clogged, in thie sttengt to prove sach intertion; iricked, instead of enlightening the Court, the masis of eviderice addinoed, the greater puit of ahlich in totally irrelcrabt to the question at isaue, is greatly caloulated, if it war criletained, to coufose the Court, in arriving at the real merits of the case. But the Court, ifjocting the cansideration of the evidnace that is nopenfugas, will teview the points upon which the enie fests.

\section*{My Lord,}

Sierva Leone, Octoler 18, 1830.
WE have pleasure in aequainting your Lordship, that the notorious Spanish slave-ship "Ieloe Prsugcra," Jozé Antonio de la Vegra, Master. having on board a cargo of \(556^{\circ}\) slaves, with which she was bound to the Havana, was, after a short, but severe action, captured, on the 7 th ultimo, in latitude s \({ }^{\circ} 8^{\prime}\) N., longitude \(4^{\prime} 17^{\prime}\) E., by His Majesty's ship " Primrose," under the command of Captain William Broughton.

The "Veloz Pasugcra" arrived here on the 8th instant, and was immediately proceeded agamst, in the British and Spanish Court of Mixed Commission, for a breach of the Treaty between Great Britain and Spain for the repression of illicit alave-trade.

The fact- of sueh illieit trade, having been fully established, sentenee of condemnation was pronounced upon the "Velos Pasagera," as good and lawful prize, on the 16 th instant, and the surviving slaves taken on board of her, in number 529 , decreed to be emancipated.

Our report upon this case we have the honour to transmit, enclosed, for your Lordship's information.

We solicited the Prize Officer of the " Velos Pesageri," Lientenant Butterfield, to favour us with a short memorandum of the action, which took place between that ship and the "Primrose," in order to cummunicate the facts thereot to your Lordship. This, however, Lieutenant Butterfield felt delicate in complying with, in consequence of Captain Broughton having reported the action, minutely, to Captain Gordon (the Senior Naval Officer on this coast), for the information of the Lords of the Admiralty. To their Lordshins, therefore, we beg to refer your Lordship, for the particulars of this nnlawful and daring act, which, according to common report, has beea attended with the loss of several lives on the British site, and of many on that of the Spanish, in addition to many on each side being wounded; among the latter, Captain Broughton seriously.

It appears that the Spminerds had the crocity to station some of the unfortunate men slaves of their guns, to assist in working them, during the action; 5 having been found dead on the main deck of the " Felos Passugera," who liad been killed, and 1 desperately wounded, by the broadsides of the "Primrose:"

The "Fclos Pasegera," whilst on this cosst, was boarded 7 times, at different dates, by His Majesty's squadron. The first time she was boarded by His Majesty's ship "Sybille," then in Acera Roads, Commodore Colliur indorsed upon her papers, that he had warned her crew, not to attempt any resistance against a British vessel, however small the latter, and that, if they resisted, they should be treated as pirates.

The Master, Jozé Antomio de la Vega, having been seriously wounded in the action, was taken on board His Majesty's ship "Primeose; and we learn. that many of the Spaniards were supplied with a boat and provisions, shortly after capture, and sent away to the nearest land they could make.

The Mate, and 22 of the men, came liere, in confinement, on board the "Veloz Pasagcra," Tliey have been landed-have been examined before the Magistrates, and commited to gaol under a charge of murder : which, under the circumstances of the resistance they made, and the lives that were lost in consequence, uppears to us, and to the Law-Officers here, a well founded charge.
It is the intention of Lientenant-Governor Findlay to cause these men to be sent to England, to be dealt with as His Majesty's Gevernment may direct. We have, \&ce.

The "Naena Isahelita" arrived here on the 20th following, and was immediately proceeded against, in the British and Spanish Court of Mixed Commission : and the proofs adduced, of her being employed in the illicit traffick in slaves, being perfectly clear and well established, the Court, on the 20th instant, pronounced sentence of condernnation upon the "Nueva Isalietitu," alias "Nunero Uno," as good and lawful prize, to the Crowns of Great Britain and Spain; and, ut the same time, emancipated 139 slaver, being the number of survivors taken on board of her, -2 having died previous to adjudication.

Oar report of this case, we beg leave most respectfully to enclose, for your Lordship's information.

The Master and Cook of the "Nuera Isabelita" having deposed, that half a cask of rum, and the medicine chest, were taken out of that vesssel by the Captor; Captain Gordon addressed a letter to us, explanatory of the circamstances, under which he was induced to remove those articles, as well as his reasons for having removed similar articles out of the Spamish schooner "Sentimgo," alias "Polasqui," reported to your Lordship in our despatch of the 31st of August last.

WE have the honour to report to your Lordslip the arrival, in this harbour, on the 2 ath instant, of the Spani=h brigantine "Pejariro." of' the Havana, commanded by Fortunato Ronsero, having on boirn at cargo of slaves, with whieh she was bound to the Havana, from the Itiver Old Calabar, when fillen in wilh, and detained, on the \(24 t \mathrm{~h}\) ult. (in hatitude \(4^{*} 22^{\prime \prime} \mathrm{N}\)., longitate \(8^{*} 20 \quad\) E., by Liemtemant Preflerick Servante, in command of the "Pass," a tender belonging to Mis Majesty's ship "Medina."

The "Pass" (Formerly the Spani-h schooner "A Maria de ln Coneeprian,") is the tender attached to His Majesty" ship "Msdina," which we nported to your Lordship in our despateh of the 16ih of September last, that is not duly furnished with the stged inetractions; by the Londs of the Admiralty, to unke captares under the slave-trade restrietion Treaties.

The "Puss," we understund, was dispatched from His Majesty"s ship "Modina," lying at the time at Princes Eslond; the latter intending to follow her tender shartly atterwards. Tliey, however, did not join after the eapture of, hand previous ti) Liettemant Sctrante sending the "Pajurifo" bere; by whom the declaration was mado.

WR beg leave to acknowledge the reccipt of your Lordship's despatch, dated November 3oth 1829, triasuitting to us the copies of a correspondence, which had passed between your Lordship and the Charge d'Affaires of the Emperor of Brazil, on the subject of the eonstruetion to be given to that stipulation of the Convention with Brazit, of the 20th of November 1826, which regulates the period for the abolition of the African slave-trade of Brazil, and transmitting also, the copy of a letter, which your Lordship had addressed, under date of the 1sth November, to the Lords Cormmissioners of the Admiralty, conveying His Majesty's commands, that the Commanders of His Majesty's Cruizeis shall be instructed, that Brazilisu slave-ships, which thall have finally quitted the African Coast, on or before the 1.3th of March 1850 , shall not be held to have incurred the liability of being treated as pirates, under the Convention with Brazil, in consequence of being found at Fca after the said period, in the bond fide prosecution of that particular homoward vaynge, which had commenced on or before the 13th of March 1830.
These, your Lordship's instructions, shall be the rule of our conduct in cases to which they may apply.

WE have the honour to acknowledge the receipt of your Lordstip's despateh, dated the 7 th of December 1829, communicating to us, for our information and guidance, the opiniun of His Majesty's Advocate-General, upon an hypothetical case, which had been submitted to that Officer ; that, after the period stipulated by Treaty, for the abolition of the Brazilian slavetrade, if any Brazilian subjects shall have recourse to bringing negroes from the Coast of Africa, on the plea of the blacks being colnnists or servants, who have entered into contracts to serve their importers or agents, during a certaiu term of years, in consideration of certain money or goods, lent to them, with ulieh they are to purchase their freedom, that act eamnot be considered in any other promit of view, than as an attempt to continue that trade under another name ; and that such Brazilian subjects will be liable to be treated and dealt with, in the same manner, as if they lad been more openly and directly engaged in the traffick for slaves.

Should the facts conkemplated come under our view, we shall be governed in our eondect by the directions of your Lardship.

The "Emilia" was furnished with an irregular passport, from the Authorities at Permambuco, anthorizing a voyage to Molembo, lor a cargo of slaves, with permission to touch, on her way to that port, at Se. Thomas. She, however, went direct to the River Bonny, where her cargo, consisting of 157 sluyes, was shipped; and she was captured, on her return voyage, on the 31st of Ootuber hast, in \(3^{-}\)latitude, North of the Equator, and \(7^{\prime \prime} 30^{\prime}\) longitude, Envt of Greenwich, by His Majesty's brig "Clitker," commanded by Licutemant George Matson.
The "Evifia" was full 2 months from the day of her captare, until her arrival in this port, owing to her very dull sailing; during which period she lost only 4 of her slares, and 5 between the time of her arrival here, and condemnation.
The faets of the illicit traffick in slaves, having been unqueationably established, and the British and Brazilian Commissary Judges agreceng in opinion, seatence of condermation was passed upon her, at a sitting of the Court, on the 14th of January; and her surviving slaves, to the number of 148 , decreed to be emancipated.

WE have the honour, with the presont despatch, to transmit, for your Lordslijp's information, the report of the case of the Brazilian echooner "Temiedora," I guacio Maned de Oliveira, Mater.

The "Tentadora" was owned by Joao ila Costa, junior, of Balifa, aner wn firnished with a regular passpert from the President of that Province (Viecoant Camamú) dated the 5th of August, 1829, authorizing a voyage to Molenbo for a cargo of slaves, whose number was not to exceed 360 .

It appears that the "Tenfadora" Left Bahia on the 17 th of August, and athough profissing to be bound direct to Molembo, as shewn by one log, (a false one) she actually went dircet to Lagos, as shewn by the trae log, where whe arrived on the 1.th of September, and she was captured, on the 1st of Novernber, being the first day of her return voyage, in latitude 5 \({ }^{-} 26^{\prime} \mathrm{N}_{\text {. }}\), longitude 4o \(18^{\prime} \mathrm{E}\), by the brig "Dallas," tender to His Majesty's ship "Sybille,"under the command of Lientenant Edward Lyne Harvey, having on board 432 slaves.
At a Court held on the 14th of Jamuary last, for the adjudication of this vessel, the Commissary Judges of the 2 nations unhesitatingly pronounced the "Tinurdorn" to be a legal capture, and condemned her as hawtul prize to the Crowns of Great Brition and Brazil; and, at the same time, decreed the emancipation of 320 slaves, the survivors of her cargo of victims, -73 having died on her passage up, and 39 after her arrival in this part.

It is with regret we feel ourselves bound to report to your Lordship, that a number of articles were taken from this vessel, after capture and betore adjucation. As the cvidence given upon this point did not, in the least, affeet the general question of the illicit traffick in slaves, we have not detailed it in our report; but have thought proper to forward an authenticgted copy of the whole of the facts deposed to, as well as copy of the minute of Court, recorded vpon the subjeet.
By this it will be pereciver, that after capture, and while the "Tentadorn" was lying in West Bay, Princes, an anchor was taken from her bows, and 2 brass stanchions, together with other things, by the eapturing Offieer; and that, after her arrival in this harbour, a number of articles were clandestinely removed ont of her.

We presume that, if the "Dallas" had really been in want of the anehor and other articles, which were taken out of the " Tenterdora," in West Bay, it was Lieutenant Harvey's duty to have certified the same, for the information of the Court; and that Mr. Seymour, the Prize Officer attached to the "Dallas," would have deposed to that fact in extenuation, had such boen the case. No notice thercof, however, was taken by either Lieutenant Harvey, or by Mr. Seymour; and, therefore, the Court considered the facts too fully proved to adinit of a doubt. It is true Mr. Seymeur, in an affidavit he made, relative to the articles which had been clandestinely taken out of the "Tentadore," after her arrival here, a copy of which is attached to the other evidence, swore, that nothing was removed out of that vessel in this harbour, to the best of his knowledge and belief; but that affidavit, being qualified, in opposition to 2 that are unqualified, did not, in the opinion of the Court, disprove the alleged facts.

The " Nova Resolusao" arrived here, on the 4th instant, with 42 of the shives ; 1 woman having died on the passage up to Sicrra Lenne.

These slaves have been landol, and placed in charge of the Liberated Atrican Department.
The "Nova Resolugap" is the 8th slaver now lying here, to be adjudicated.

I have, further, to report to your Lordship, that M. de Paiva, Brazilian Commissary Judge , has consented, that the Colonial Government should distribute the whole of the slaves, that were detained on board the 6 Brazilian vessels, that were here previous to the arrival of the "Nowa Resolucrae" and who had been landed and placed in charge of the Liberated African Drpartment.
The number of slaves, so distributed in the different villages, amounts to alout 1,200 .

THE carrying on of the slave-trade by Brazilian subjects, having now, under the Convention between Great Britain and Brazil, become piracy, every means that such subjects can invent to carry on that traffick, and to evade the penalty of the law now to be enforced, will, I have no doubt, be tried.
The liypothetical case, which your Lordship was pleased to communicate, for the information of His Majesty's Commissioners, under date of the \(\overline{\text { th }}\) of December 1829 , may probably, ere long, be, in fact, attempted.
Auother suppositious case, and one which is of easy execution, suggests itself to me as being extremely prohable, and which the Captains of His Majesty's squadron on this coast, think will shortly be carried into effect.
The Islands of Princes and St. Thornas, in the Bight of Biafra, and tho Cape de Verd Islands, form the extreme points, within which the illicit traftick in slaves has been successfally carried on, to the northward of the Equator. It is, therefore, apprehended, that Brazilian vessels will, trom this time, come to one or other of those islands, as may beat suit that part of the Coast of Africa, intended to be the scene of their slave operations, and obtain, by purchase, from the Authorities of such islands, Portuguese papers; which papers, I am informed, can be realily procured for a few dollars. Under the flag of Portugal, thus surreptitiously procured, Brazilian subjects will, moot likely, endeavour to avoid the poinalty of piracy, and still contiaue to carry on the slave-trade, with the same success, (unfortumately for the carse of humanity) that has, heretofore, characterized the trade under the flag of their own nation.

The 4 th Article of the Treaty between Great Britain and Portugal, signed at Vienna, the 22d day of January 1815, expressly stipulates, that Portugal, in carrying on the slave-trade, will not permit her flag to be used, except for the purpose of supplying the Transatantic possessions belonging to the Crown of Portugal.
By the 3d and 4 th seetions of the 1st Article of the Alditional Convention to the said Treaty, of the 22d of January 1815, signed at London the 2sth of July, 1817, the High Contracting Partios deelare, that they consider os illicit any traffick in slaves, carried on under the Portuguese flag, for the account of the subjects of any other Government; and by Portuguese vessels bound for any port not in the dominions of His Most Faitliful Majesty. The Brazils, which were, at the time the Treaty was coneloded, the Transatlantic possessions of the Crown of Portugal therein alluded to, having becume an Independent State, and acknowledged as suelh by Portugal, I infer, that the trade in slaves, under the flag of the latter Power, ean no longer be lawfully carried on:- in fact, strictly speaking, that, from the time Brazil was acknowledged as an Independent State, From that time Portugal, having no Transatlantic possessions of her own to supply with slaves, did, by the said Treaty, totally abolish the slavi-trade.
If, however, any doubts should exist in your Lordhip's mind, as to thisbeing a correct reading of the Treaty, and that, therefore, the opiuion I have formed is not well grounded : I think, that the 3 d and 4 hh sections of the 1 et Article to the Convention, will clearly operate to prevent the flag of Portugal from being used in the imanner contemplated. For, it Portuguese subjects were really earrying on the slave-trade for their own account, ander the Portuguese flag, and bound for Brazil, they would bo bound for a port not in the dominions of His Most Eaithful Mojesty; and if they were carrying on that trade, under the same flag, for Brazilian subjects, sueh would be illicit, us it would be for the account of the subjects of another Government. In each case, therefore, the confiscation of vissels and cargoes, detained under those circumstanees, must, in tny opinion, follow.

With these views upon the subject-a subieet that has elaimed my serious reflection- 1 hold, that ressels, slaving under the Portoguese flug, will be, liable, wherever met with, cither north or south of the Equator, to bof detained for a direet breach of the Treaty and Convention-a breach that will subject them to condemnation.

Itis likely that great ditficulty will be experienced, in establishing the proof of the nation to whelh the partics, carrying on the slave-trade under the Portuguese flag, belong. If they cuuld be proved to be Braziliansubjects, notwithstanding they were under a different flag, the penalty of piracy would attach to them: but otherwise, they, in their own persors, may escape the Nutighment due to such lasless expeditions; although their vessis and eargoen may be confiscated.

The Government of Portugal, I presume, could not successfully unaintain that her subjects were injured by such confiscation, and thereupoo claim to be indemnificd.

Sierra Leone, May 15, 1830.
WE have the honour to forward to your Lordship, herewith, our report upon the circumstanees, which led to the condemnation of the schooner "Nussa Senhara da Cinin," Jozé Fernandez Soares, Master, sailing under the Brazilian flag, and owned by Jozé Joaquim d'Oliveira, of Bahia.

The "Sasvn Senhera da Guia" was furnished with a passport, from the President of the Province of Bahia, allowing her to proeeed to Cabinda for a cargo of slaves, with liberty to call at Pernambuco. Slie, however, sailed direct from Bahia to Lagos, in the Bight of Benin, and shipped, at the latter place, 310 slaves, and she was captared, on the 7 th of January, 1830, in latitule \(6.18^{\prime} \mathrm{N}\)., langitude \(3^{\circ} 30^{\prime} \mathrm{E}\)., with the whole of them on board, (they having been shipped only the day previous) by the brig "Dallas," (tender to His Majesty's ship "Sybille,") under the command of Lieutenant Edwarl Lyne llarvey.
The "Nossa Scahora do Guia" unfortunately lost 58 of the slaves on the passage up, which is principally to be attributed to their having had the smallpors amonget them, many of whom were recovering from that disease on her arrival in the harbour of Sierra Leope, on the 19th of February; 14 also dicd afierwards.

The illicit traffick in slaves having been fully acknowledged, by the witnesses produced in this case, sentence of condemnation was passed upon her, and her surviving slaves, 238 in number, were decreed to be emancipated, on the 13th of May.

We again feel ourselves compelled to notice to your Lordship, that, at the time of the detention of "Nossa Senhora da Guia," a four-inch cable, 120 fathoms in length, and a new mainsail, were taken out of her, and carried on board the "Dullas." Both the witnesses in this case positively swore to the fact. No mention of this was made in the list of storessent up with the Captor's declaration, nor was any explamation whatever offered to the Court; the Proctor for the Captor, at the hearing of the case, cleclaring his inability to afford any.

WE have the honour to acgunint vont Lordathip, that the Brazilian brigantine "Primeira Rosalia," Joao Sabino Master, was detained, on the 23d of January, 1830, by His Majesty's ship "Sybille," Conmodore Collier, in latitude \(3<24^{\prime} \mathrm{N}\)., longitude \(7^{\circ} 0^{\prime} \mathrm{E}\)., having on bourd 282 slaves.
The "Primcira Rosalia" was owned by Manoel Francisco Morcira, of Bahia, and was furnished with a passport by the Visconde de Camamin, the President of the Province, dated the 21 st of October 1829, for a legitimate voyage for slaves, to be shipped at the Port of Cabinda.
It appeared by the evidence of the Master and the Cook, that the "Pri meira Rasalia" had really sailed from Bahia to Cabinda, and from Cabinda she went to Lagos, where the 282 slaves, found on board ber, were shipped, 4 days previous to capture.
\(3 i\) of these unfortunate creatures died from small-pox, on the passage up to this port, where the "Prinacirn Rosalia" arrived on the 26ith of February; and although disease then apprared to be at a stand, 9 died between the period of her arrival, and the day of their being located, making a total of 40 deaths.
Sentence of condemnation was passed upon the "Primeiro Rosulia," and her serviving'slaves, 242 in number, were deereed to be emaneipated, on the 13th of May.
We brg most respectfully to enclose, for your Lordship's information, a report, detailing the facts of the case.

WE have the honour, with the present despatch, to enelose, for your Lordship's information, our report of the circumatanees attendant upon the cajpure and condemnation of the Brizinian sehooner " Eimbelinat."

The "Liubelina" left Bahia the latter cend of last November, and stecred direct for Lagos, where she took on board 377 slaves, and quitted that place, on her return, on the 13th January last. She was detained, on the following 1sth, by His Majesty's ship " Sybille," Commodare Collier, in latitude 3" \(48^{\prime}\) N., lousitude \(4^{\circ} 12^{\circ}\) E., who inmediately dispatehed ber to Sierra. Leone, where she arrived on the 13th of March.

The "U'nbelian" was both owned and commanded by Joan Ciardoza dos Santos, of Bohia, who readily deposed to the truth, that the "Uimbeline" wis, at the time of detention, engaged in the illicit traflick in slaves.
Sentenre of condemnation, was, therefore, pronounced upon the "Clar Scliner," as good and lawful prixe, and the sarviving slaves captared on board of her were decreed to be emaneipated, at a Court leeld for that purt pase on the 13th of May.
The number of slaves so emancipated, amounted only to 163,-214 having died from the day of the detention of the "Unabidina" to that of her adjudication, viz. 194 on the passage up here, and 20 after her arrival.
The masually great and lamentable number of deaths, that occurred oit board this vessel, induced as to request the Surgeon to the Court to explainh. as far as his judgment would lead him to a conclusion, by the healtis of the survivors, to what cause this was to be uttributed. A copy of the reply he sent to us, we beg leave to trausmit, herewith, for your Lordship's informatiog upon the subject.

THE report of the casc of the Brazilian brigantine "Nova Resolusuo," Which we now have the honour to enclose, will put your Lordehip in possession of the facts which led to the capture of that vessel, in fatitude \(25^{2} 25^{\circ}\) N., longitude \(1^{\circ} 9^{\prime} \mathbf{E}_{0}\), on the 2 d of February last, by His Majesty's ship S
"Medina," Edward Webb, Esq. Commander; and to her condemnation, for illicitly traificking in slaves, on the 13th of May.
The " Nove Fiesoluram" had on board, at the time of capture, 43 slaves, who had been shipped at a place called Awey, just below Cape St. Paul,
Only 1 of the slares died on the passage up, and the 42 survivors were deereed to be emancipated on the diy the vessel was condemned.
We again regret to uequaint your Lordslip, that a number of articles were taken out of the " Nora Rexalrigno" at the time of eapture.

The Master and Cook (the witmesses in the canse) both deposed to certain live stock, rope, muskets, and gunpowder, having been removed out of her into the "Medina;" and, although the First Lieutemant of the "Medina," Mr. Serrante, has, in explanation, deposed, that the lire stock was taken out for the support and use of that part of the crew of the "Noma Resolucga" taken on toard His Majesty's ship, some of whom were sick; that the muskets and gunpowder were taken out for the preservation of the vessel, and have been restored since the "Medina" came into this port, from her cruize to leeward, yet offers none relative to the rope.
M. de Paiva, His Imperial Majesty's Commissary Judge, reflected upon such conduct, and announced his intention, in Court, to report it to his Government.

Sierra Leone, May 27, 1830.
WE havethe honour to aequaint your Lorderip, that, on the 28 th November last, the boats of His Majesty's ship "Eden," monder the command of Lieutenant Mercer, detsined, in the River Cameroons, the Brazilian brigantine "Ismenin," of Rio de Janciro, ownell by Manoel Jozí Ribciro Guimaraens, of that city, and commanded by Joao Antonio da Silva.

The " Ismenia" arrived in this harbour on the 10th of January last, and was duly proceeded agninst, in the British and Brazilian Court of Mixed Commissious, for a breach of the Convention betweeu Great Britain and Brazil, for the repression of the illicit traffich in slaves.

Lieutenant Mereer, the bonrding Officer in this ease, made the declaration. He therein states, "that on examining her hold, it appeared that her bulk was broken, and a great part of her cargo landed at the town of King Bell, in the Cameroons, who deelared that he had received part of her cargo, for the purpose of trafficking, in the eountry, for slaves, and a number of irons for their confimement; likewise he had some slaves, previously perchased for the "Ismentia," in his charge, which said faets of her having broken boll, landed a great part of her cargo, !ikewise her having slaves on shore at King Bell's Town, and being at the time at anehor in the River Cameroons, in latitude \(7^{\circ} 0^{\prime} 5^{\prime \prime}\) N., longitude \(9^{\circ} 20^{\prime}\) E., being all contrary to the existiug Treatics between His. Britannick Majesty and His Bmperial Majmsty the Emperor of Brazil, I detained the said vesse), for the purpore of being broughte before the Mixed Commission Court, for a breach of the said Treatics."
The " Srnenia," had no slaves on braard at the time of dictention, but isas furnished with an imperial passport, to trade for slaves at Cabinda, Zaire, and Molembo, with liberty to touch at Princes and St. Thomas.
The witnesses positively deny the allegations of the Captor, and swear, that the "Ismesitu" sustained an injury nt the main-mast, in a storm, which obliged them to take her into the River Cameroons to repair it; in which statements, with little variation, they all agree.
The monition, in this ease, had been returned, on the 20th of Jannary, and the procecdings were ready to be submitted for the consideration of the Comtuissary Judges of the two nations, when the case was delayed, until the arrival here, on the 26th ultimo, of Lieutenant-Governor Findlay, who, having assumed the duties of His Majesty's Commissary Judge, ad inlerim, immediately swore Mr. Lewis into the situation of Registrar, the duties of which uffice he forthwith entered upon.
The "Ismenia's" easc, was, therefore, shortly afterwards, brought under the consideration of the British and Brazilian Commissary Judgen. In thecourse of the proceedings consequent thereon, M. de Paiva demamded, that the affilavit of the Captor, substantiating his charges aghiost the " Iszacnin," should be filed, before he went to the adjudication of that vessel.
A copy of the letter M. de Paiva addressed to His Majesty's Commisary Judge, ad imterim, upon the subjeet, together withen copy of the reply returned to that gentlemm, we beg, most respectfally, to chelore.
Although great ineorivenience may arise lhereform, it cinsequence of tha Captor having quitted the station, yet, on relerting to the Sd Artide of the Re-
 His Majesty's Commissioners here, of the 27, th of Septenbor 1898, communicating to them the opiaion of the King's Alvocete, upon the necessity of the presence of the Commander of the capturing hifip , ia which be states, that either of the Cowmissioners have a riglit to demand it: Iix Majesty's? Commissary Judge did not see that he could, juisly, oller any oljections to. M. de Pavin's demand.

WE have the honour to forward, herewith, for your Lordship's information, the copy of a letter, addressed by His Majesty's Consul at St. Jago, Cape de Verdus, under date of the 26 th of Mareh 1830, to Mr. George Jackson, His Majesty's Commissary Judge at thas place, notifying that M. A. Martins, a resident of Boa Vista, Lhad obtained permission, from the Portuguese Government, to import, from the sectements of Bissao and Cacheo, on this coast, annually, 150 slaves, for the alleged purpose of establishing a fishery.

\section*{Sterra Leone. (Portugal.)}

The permission, thus granted by the Porluguese Government to M. A. Martins, is, in our humble opinion, directly at variance with the provisions of the Treaty and Convention, between Great Britain and Portugal, for the repression of the illicit traffick in slaves.
By the 1st Article of the Convention it is stipulated, that the High Contracting Parties consider as illicit any traffick in slaves, carried on by Portupuese vesscls, in any harbours or roads on the Coast of Africa, which are prohibited by the 1st Article of the Treaty of the 22d of January 1815; which said 1st Article of the Treaty makes it unlawful for the subjeets of the Crown of Portugal, to purchase slaves, or to carry on the slave-trade, on any part of the Coast of Africa, to the Northward of the Equator, upon any pretest, or in any manner, whatsoever.

If, therefore, His Majesty's cruizers should detain any vessel belonging to M, A, Martins, carrying over slaves from Cacheo to Bissao, under the permission he has obtained for their importation into the Cape de Verde Islands, we shall not hesitate to condemn the vessel, for being engaged in the illicit traffick in slaves, and decree the emancipation of the slaves, who may be found on board at the time of capture.

ON the sth instant sailed the Spanish schooner "Hieria," D. Antonio Manubo, for the Coast of Africa.

On the 7 th instant arrived in this port the Spanish schooner "Ligera," alias "Inlrepidu," D. Joré Ramion Zavala, Master, and on the 2tth instant, the schooner "Amistad Habazera, D. Dionisio Erguijo, Master, both vessels having previously landed slaves on the coasts of this island. These 2 vessels were reported by me to the Captain-Gencral, and I have receised the customary answer,-that nothing against them is proved by theirlog-books.
On the 25 th instant arrived the brig "Ricerde," D. Marcellino Moran, Master, which sailed from this port so long ago as the 2d October 182s, laving been blockaded by one of His Majesty's schooners in the River Bonny; it appears that, after losing a great part of her crew, and a whole cargo of negroes, by sielness, she was obliged to sail for this island in ballast. Tho exjedition consequently has been most ruinous to her Owners.

Almirante" which was lately coptured on the Const of Africa, and sold, after condemnation, at Sierra Leone, arrived here lately, under Brazilian colours, in ballast, the ofject of ther present Owners betag, it is suid, to scll lier again to the slave-traders of the Havana.

The "Gallie," which is a small sehooner of less than 60 toms, snited foom the Havana, on the 18th Eebruary last, under the command of D. Francico Garcia, us if bound for the Isla de Principe. She made, lowever, direct for the River Pongm, near Sierrat Leone, where resides the notorious slave merchart Johin Ormond, from whose factory, on the 6th October last, shem took on board, in exchange for ber eargo, 144 negroes. Of these, 8 died before her detration by the "Nimble," and 1 afier. The "Galliso," previous to being captured, was dismasted, owing to her having manle rome resistance, which was attributed, as usual, by the crew, to their mintaking His Majesty's sehooner for a Columbian privateer. Une of the crew, Thomas Johnson, is an American citizen, and was accordingly delivered over to the - American Consul, by Licutenant Sherer.

John Ormond, the prineipal slave-dealer in the Rio Pongo, is a mulatto, and son, I am told, of a Genoese, formerly occupied in this traffick. I bedieve he has himself made more than one voyage to the Havana, with a cargo of negroes, although he now styles himselt a king or prinee of the country. The manner it which this min dares to carry on his traffick, in the vicinity of Sierra Leone, will be best shewn by his account current with the Master of the "Galliso," a copy of which, together with another of a certificate of his having detained a Spanish sailor, I now have the liomnar to forward to your Lordship, in the event of its being possible to punish him.

The various individuals of the "Galtilo" who were examined, have sworn, flat Francisco Garsia, the Master, is also the Ownes, but in this they have only stupidly perjured themsolves, for anong the papers annexed to the proceedings, there is the Custom-Bonse Register, by which it appears, that Messrs. Busto and Inclan, Merchants of this city, mre the real Owbers. These Merchants who liave litely become Bankrupts, were Owners, as 1 have already hat the honour of informing your Lordship, of the "Goloadriana," captured in the beginning of this year, by His Majcty's sehooner "Piekle." It may also be collected from a serap of paper, found ois board the "Gallito" by the Cuptors, and which appears to be a vough draft of some letter formerly writen by D Francisco Garcia ta his Owner, that the echooner "Pronla," mentioned in my despatel, dated 1oth Oetober last, likenve helangs to 11 . Ramon Inclan, and sailed, in the course of last summer, from the Roo Pongo, with a eargo of slaves for this island. I fear, therefore, that the abosementioned part of the Alrican Coast, is much haunted by small Spanish slave-vessels.

ON the 1st inatant the American sehooner "WF illizu Gavduer," W. F. Hill, Master, sailed for Galinas, on the Caast of Africa; and it is reported that her object is to aid some Spanish slave-vessels, which are blockaded in that river by His Mejesty's cruizers, in bringing off their slaves.

On the 3d instant the Spanish schooner " Urrace," D. Joze Fernando de la Vega, Master, also sailed for the African Const.
\(\mathrm{On}_{\mathrm{n}}\) the 7 th instant the Spanish brig " Nueva Amalia," D. Francisco Granell, Master, a vessel which I have already had the bonour of briaging under your Lordship's notice, in my despatch of the 25th of May last, arrived from Africa. As this vessel was, aecording to the English and American newspapers, publickly fitted out for the slave-trade at Bareclona, I thought it right to mention the circumstance to the Captain-General; and I now beg leave to enclose copics of the correspondenee which has passed respeeting her. I have not yet received intelligence of the result of the investigation, which his Exeelleney has directed to be made into this case of slave-trade.

On the 10th instant the setiooner "Maria," D. Francisco Romero, Master, arrived here, after having landed a cargo of slaves. This Francisco Romero, I have every reason to believe, is the same person who cominanded the " Muria," which was destroyed, last year, by His Majesty's schooner "Skipjnck." "The vessel now arrived was not fitted out from the Havana; but, whether she be the same vessel, respeeting which I nm commanded, by your Lordship's despateh of the 19th of August last, to forward intelligence, I am us yet umable to state; in the first place, because "Maria" is one of the most common names for Spanish vessels; and secondly, because the crew of the "Giallito" have stated to Lieutenant Sherer, of His Majesty's schooner "Nimble," that a Spanish shave-vessel, called ". Maria," fitted out from Cadiz, was lately taken by one of His Majesty's cruizers on the Coast of Africa. As the force of the sehooner arrived, appears to agree with that mentioned in Mr. Boeanquet's note to M. Salmon, of the 17 th of Junc last, pertraps the name of the Master, now stated, will enable His Majesty's Consul at Cadiz to ascertain whether she be the same ressel. I hive the honour to enclose eopies of the correspondence, which has passed between the Captain-General and myself, on the subject of the "Maria" whieh has arrived. His Excellency allows that she was fitted out in Cadiz.

ON the subject of the slave-trade of this island, during the year just expired, I am sorry to be under the necessity of making a report, ecarcely less deplorable than that, which I had the honour of laying before your Lordship, for the year 1828. The following rbstract will show how little this traftick can be said to have diministied.

In the year 1828, there sailed for the Coast of Africa, from this port, according to the list I have the honour to enclose, no less than 63 vessels. of these only 2, which eleared out for the Canaries, have returned with hawfut cargoes. The remainder must be considered as true slave-traders, of which 1 has returned without a eargo, and another, according to report, has been shipwrecked; 3 are said to have been captured on the Coast of Alrica, by His Majesty's cruizers, and 1 by the Columbians, while 6 bave been conderned by the Mixed Comernission at the Havana, and 35 are known to have safoly landed their slaves. With the fate of the other 14 I am not acquaiuted.

In 1829, the number of vessels which cleared out for the Coast of Africa, becing 45, was less than during the preceding year, but the number of urrivals, during the same respective periods, has inereased from 28 to 33 . From the enclosed lists of arrivals and departures, for 1829 , it will be seen, that 2 vessels have succeeded in landing 2 cargoes, within the 12 months, and that several bave beco able to take 2 departures for the Coast of Africa. Of the 45 vessels which have saited during the year just expired, 9 have already returned, and I has been captured by His Majesty's schooner "Nimble."

The decrease that has taken place in the number of departures, is to be attributed, without doubt, to the comparative failure, during the past year, of these illegal expeditions. His Majesty's cruizers appear to have been more chan ordinarily successtul, on the Coast of Africa, as well as in thres scas. The shave-vessels, morcover, which have arrived, have, in general, sufireed so much by mortality, as to reduce most considerably the profits of their voyuges. From the utter ruin of the Proprictors of small coffice estates, an extraordinary number of slaves have been brought this ycar into the market; and, fimilly, a very general bankruptey has lately taken place among the shoppkeepers of the Iavana, who, according to the sebedales preseated to their creditors, appear to have been extensive holders of shares in slave-vessels. These have all been so many causes tending to depress the traffick; and, indeed, the general ruin of the shopkeepers of the llavana, has been, it a very great degree, attributed to their obstinate gambling in the slare-trade. 1 an truly grieved, however, to be obliged to state, that I cannot consider the traffick to have received the least cheek, either from the local Government, or the Government at home. On the contrary, the slave-traders feel more thinn ever convincrd, that they will be protected as far as possible.

The Royal Order of the soth of Jume last, of which your Lordsluip wis pleased to transanit me a copy, nppears, by the unuber of notorious slavevesselk, which continue to be allowed to sail for the Atriean Const, never to have produced the slightest efficet.

The arrivals of the "Fama de Cadis," the "Elena," alias "La PaE," the "Marie," and the "Airees Amalia," which have been fitted out in the ports of Spain, and the singular proceedings here in the case of the French vessad "Le Mertin," will not, certainly, tend to discourage a traffick, of which, however, the impolicy ought now to be as manifest as the cruclty. It is my humble opinion, that were Spain really inclined to abolish the slave-trade, she could effect her purpose, so far as regards the inhalitants of this idand, with less difficulty than is commonly supposed. An inspection of the carions muster-rolls of the vessels condemned by thin Mixed Commission, has shown me the truth of what I had long before heard, thint not one in 30 of the crew of a olave-vessel is a vative of Cuba. In fact, the crews, as well as the most Z

notorions fitters out of such expeditions, are Europeans ; and although the mative planters are, of course, glad to procure slaves at the lowest possible price, yet, I believe, the majority of them would have little objection to sacrifice a temporary profit, to the solid advantige of not having their lives and propertics endangered by the unlimited increase of the black population. Thieir feelings on this last head are sufficiently manifested by the uhsiety they have of hate shown, to get rid of the emancipated negroes.

On the most effiectual means of suppressing the trafick, I have nothing to add, to what Ilis Majroty's Commissioners have alfeady stated to their Government. 1 venture, however, to assure your Lord hitp, that it is much to be disired, on every account, that some measures should be adopted, to prevent British subjeets, from entering on board Spanish slave-vessels. To allure our ignorant scamen by high wages, scems to be a favourite plan, at present, with the slave-trader, and as many have been trained to arms, on bonird His Majesty's slips, they may, in some cases, render the resistance of slavevessels much more desperate.

ON the 22 d ult. 2 schoneners took their departure for the Coast of Africn, namely, the "Aerostatien," commanded by Manuel Aldcon, and the "Barbarita," commanded by Salvador Felice; and yesterday sniled for the same destination, another notorious schooner, called "Pegarilo," D. Fortunato Romero, Master.

On the 16 th ultimo, the schooner "Planela," D. Pedeo Manegat, arrived in this harbour, in ballast, as did the schooner "Sigun el Tiempo," D. Joze Escardo, Master, on the 29d ult.; the brif "Marinero, D. Manuel Izquierdo, on the 23d ult. ; and the schouner "Potosi," D. Juan Bantista Zavala, on the 26 th ult. All these vessels, having previously landed slaves on the coast, were duly reported by me to the Governor: but his Exeellency has been pleased to retarn, in each case, the usual answer,-that nothing has been found in their log-books to criminate them.

Havana, March 4, 1830.
ON considering the circumstances attending the capture of the 5 British sulyects on board the slave-vessel " Midas," and their being ordered for immediate trial to England, I think it possible that Adrairal Fleeming may not deem it neccssary to apply to me, for more evidence than what he himself can furnish, by the testimony of the officers and crew of the eapturing vessel. As I know, however, the necessity of going into Court with the ease for the prosecution being made as clear as possible, and, moreover, the inconvenience of any further lass of time, 1 take the liberty of enclosing a duly certified copy of the muster-roll of the "Miclas," that is, of the paper which first indueed me to desire Lieatenant Shorer to ascertain how many British suljects were on hoard the vessel. It is a paper of importanee, inasmuch as it shews, that British subjects did embark at the Havana, on board an armed slave-vessel, bound for the 1sland of St. Thomas, on the Coast of Africa. The names, indeed, with the exception of Francis Jobs, do not agree with those which 1 believe to be the real mames of the 5 British subjects found on boards but it is clear, that the names in the muster-roll of the persons, whose domiciles are stated to be Ireland, Baltimore, Portland, and New York, are not English names, and, therefore, we may tairly presume, that the persons, (whether Englishmen or Americans) there alluded to, entered on board the "Midus" under fictitious names, a circumstance which goes fir to prove a guilty knowledge on their part of what they were about.

Although the list of names is, in fact, the onty part in this domment, of any irmportance in the prosceution of these 3 men , I have thought it best to let Ilis Majesty's Government have it entire, and certified by the Secretary of the Mixed Commission, as the recognized and duly swora keeper of our archives. Knowing, howerer, that human life may, in some degree, depend on this doenment, I have myself earefully collated the copy with the originai, and, with the exeeption of the letter V in the name Givilformo Vil of the copy, being, in my opinion, an N in the original, I consider it to bea perfectly correct copy. This discrepaney indeed, is of little consequence, and the awliward manner in which the names are written, makes it impossible to ascertain which is the correet mode of reading the name in question.

I have only further to observe, that the muster-roll is the only paper of the "Milles" that makes any mention of the names of her crew.

ON the 7 th instant, the notorious schooner "Gallega," D. Francisco Eabieses Master, arrived in this port, after having landed a cargo of slaves. The Captain-General has returned the usual form of answer to my denunciation of this vessel.
The schooner "Bella Jukiana," D. Joze Escardo, Master, sailed yesterday for the Coast of Africa.
I have already had the honour of informing your Lordship, that the brig "Manzanares," D. Manuel Alcantara, Master, sailed from this port for the Coast of Africa, on the 31st August last. It appears now, that on her voyage out, she plundered the American vessel "Candace," from Boston. The American Government has, in consequence, ordered the "Mavzanares" to be seized, wherever she may be fallen in with, and we have for a month or 6 weeks past, had the mouth of this harbour and Mantanzas watched by American schooners of war. The United States trigate "Falroouth," Com" modore Elliot, Commander, has likewise arrived in the Havana, on the same errand; and Commodore Elliot informs me, that he has obtained from the Captain-General his promise to issue a general order to all the out-ports of this island, directing that wherever the "Manzanares" may arrive, she shall be immediately seized, and her crew lodged in prison.

Ho consented, however, to give up the name of the vessel, which tarns out to be the schooner " Santa Rosa," litted out in Spain for the slave-trade, the Commander, D. Vicente Kicoma, and her Consignees, Messrs. Periz and Co., of Matanzas. On Licntenant Tullolis furnishing me with copies of his correspondence with the Gavernor of Matanzas, I transmitted them, with the note (a copy of which I have the ouour to enclose) to the Captain-General, and I uow beg leave to lay before.

letter addressed to His Majesty's Commissioners on his arrival, by Captain Parker, is herewith enclosed. In consequence of this letter, I requested the Governor to lose no time in taking charge of the negroes, and summoned a Court of the Mixed Commission, which met on the 29 th ult, and following days. I have the honnur to enclose a copy of Captain Parker's certificate of the state of the negroes, at the time they were delivered up to the CaptainGeneral, as also an abstract of the evidence produced before the Mixed Commission, and a translation of the provisional decision of this Court, signed on the 5th instant. By this last document your Lordship will perceive, that the Spanish Commissioners still adhere to the opinion expressed in their letter of the 5th of February, 1829, a translation of which I had the honour to enclose in my despateh of the 10th of February 1829. They still declare the general necessity of the presence of the Commander of the capturing vessel. This I could not admit, but I conceived myself bound to agree with my Colleagues, that the Treaty required more evidence to be produced than had been presented in this case of the "Santiago," because the 3d Article of the Regulations for these Mixed Commissions, as antexed to the Treaty, specifies, that the Court shall " receive the depositions on oath of the Captain, and of 2 or 3 at least of the principal individuals on board of the detained vessel. And it is a singular circumstance attending this case of detention, that we have no evidence whatever respecting the crew of the "Santiago," of whom only the Captain and a negro sailor have been presented to the Mixed Conmission.

The final decision must eonsequently stand over until the appearance of Captain Gill. I did not certainly sce any necessity for addressing the CaptainGeneral on this subject, and even acquainted my Colleagues, that I had privately taken, what 1 conceived to be effictual, measures for securing the Captor's speedy presenee; but they conceived, that a letter from them to the Captain-General, enelosing the Court's provisional decision, would be the more formal mode of proceeding.

WITH reference to my despatch to the Earl of Aberdeen, I beg leave to observe, that it seems to me most expedient that the Spanish Government should be indaced to plaee the same construction on the Treaty, which His Majesty's Government has done, with respect to the question of the presence of the Commanders of eapturing vesscls. In the particular case of the "San2 E

\section*{Havana.}
tiage," the presence of Captain Gill has become necessary, from the mode in which he has exceuted his instructions: but I cannot do otherwise than observe, that had this Olficer placed the cridence against the "Santingo", in the most satisfactory state, my Spanish Colleagues, proceeding on their general construction of the Treaty, would still have demanded his presence. It is needless to expatiate upon the inconvenience, delay, and expense that must result from the Spanish Government thus continving to interpret the Treaty, in a manner different from His Majcsty's Officers. Trusting, therefore, that this important point may soon be satiffectorily arrauged between the two Governments, I would next venture to suggest, that as the Officers of His Majesty's cruizers, who do not come in with their prizes, must themsolves decide what evidence will be required of them, there is an abselate necessity for their being furnished with the most full instructions. I believe that, at present, they are only supplied with a part of the Treaty, and not at all with those forms of proceedings, drawn up for the guidance of these Mixed Commissions by His Majesty's Government, and formally adopted in the Havana, with the consent of the Court of Madrid. 1 venture, therefore, humbly to propose, that His Majesty's cruizcrs be furnished with the whole of the Treaty, and with the abovementioned torms of proceeding. Hitherto, as the Captor has invariably accompanied his prize to the Havana, it was the business of His Majesty's Commissioners to see that his papers were all in order belore he eame into Court; but now, when the Captor may abscnt himself, they, of course, cannot assist him ; and it his papers are forwarded to the Court incorrect, or insufficient, they find themselves, instead of being (as bound by oath) impartin! judges, placed in the situation of his advoeates. Whien once the Commissioncrs, whether English or Spanish, are allowed to become the advocates of their respective countrymen, and do not strictly abide by the Treaty, it is manifest that this Mixed Commission will be of little use towards the restriction of the slave-trade; for, independently of the contional contentions that will result, the British part of tive Commision is always liable to be ootyoted by the Spanish. 1 beg leave, therefore, earnestly to request, that His Majesty's eruizers be furnished, henectorward, with the most full instructions, and be ordered to obey them implieity. Of the absolute neecssity of this, 1 can give no better example than this ease of the "Santiago," detained by Captain Gill, eopies of whose only 3 certificates, 1 now cenclose. He forwarded no letter, or other paper, to the Commission.
1. The first difficulty made by the Spanish Commissioners was, as to there being no sufficient proof of the "Sparrowhank" laving been in possestion of the instructions which, according to Art. 9 of the Treaty, authorize a British vessel-of-war to detain a Spanish slave-vesscl. On this point, I conceive Mr. Miller's cridence sufficiently conclusive, but my Spanish Colleagues thought not, and argued that Captain Gills not having the Treaty in his possession, was a fair inference from the fact of his not having com plied with its provisions. It is to be obsersed that he himself states nothing whatever on the subjiect.
2. Captain Gill was bournd by Art. 6 of the Instructions, to leave on board the slave-vessel the Captain and a part, at least, of his crew. By Art. 3 of the Regulations, the Commission must receive the depositions, on oath, of the Captain and 2 or 3, at least, of the principal imdividuals on board the detained vessel. But Captain Gill has given no classification of the negroes of the "Santiago," as to age, sex, or liealth: and, indeed, the first classification which has been made of them, seems to be drawn up by tha Salyor, Captain Parker,
4. Captain Giil was bound by the above Article of the Instructions, and according to the beforementioned form of declaration, given in the course of procceding, laid down for these Commissions, to declare whecher the "Saatiago" was sufficiently supplied with provisions for ber intended voyage to the Havanu, and, above all, whether or not she was sea-worthy, Captain Gill has not mode any such statement; but that the "Santingo" was not sea-worthy, is sufficiently clear, from the following extract from the Prize-Master's log, April 10, 1830:-
"One P.M. so received my final orders, and parted company with tho "Sparrowhawk," for the Havana. Found 3 feet water in the hold. Employed at the pumps."

It is impossible to suppose that any British Officer could have dispatehed Its human beings on a long voyage, in such a vessel, thad be been aware of her state; and Itherefore infer, that if Captain Gill had known that his duty. was to certify the "Santiag a's" state, at the time of detention, he would have ordered her to be surveyel, and thus would have been prevented from placing so many human lives in imminent danger.
5. By the 6 th Article of the Instructions, "the Captor is bound to deliver to the Captain of the slave-ship, a signed certificate of the papers seized on board the said vessel." By the form of such certificate, as given in the aforesaid tules, it appears that the papers ought to be numbered and endorsed by the Captor. Captain Gill did peither. He takes them from the Master of the slaver; gives a receipt for them, and forwards them, without any envelope, by Mr. Miller, to the Mixed Coumission, accompanied by a certificate, which, probably owing to bis not being acquainted with the Spanish language, gives quite an erroneous deseription of them. Fortunately, the Master of the slaver at once acknowledged these papers before the Mixed Commission: but if he had not, these papers, being crroneously described by the Captor, and neither numbered or endorsed by him, would have been very difficult to identify, particularly as the Prize-Master could only depose, that he received them loose from Captain Gill. I, tharcfore, would suggest, that every Captor be directed to number and endorse the papers of a detained vessel, as soon as he reccives them. For purposes of identification it is indeed scarcely sale in the Captor to attempt to deseribe their purport, unless he be well versed in the Spanish language.

In making the foregoing remarks, I trust that I shall not be understood to intend any thing prejudicial to Captain Gill, whom I have heard to be a most deserving Officer; my ouly object being to state such facts, as will show the necessity of His Majesly's cruizurs being benceforward firnistied with the whole of the Treaty, and the rules of proceeding drawn up for the guidance of these Commissions. The "Sparrowhawk" is, I learn, just arrived on this station: she cannot, therefore, be expected to be aequamed wilh thed to make another of the coasts of this island; and I thus may be allowed to make another
remark, that when any Olfieer appoints a prize crev to a detained vessel in these seas, it ought not only to be sufficient to mavigate, but also to detend her. Had the "S Santiago" fallen in with a pirate, or had she even been run ashoreat Cape San Antonio, as Mr. Miller wascendeavouring, at the time she was providentially descried by the "Shancy," the consequences would have been dreadful. No one acquainted with these islands, can doubt as to whar would have been the fate of the prize crew, intif, had slave-vessel could lave been harbour, they would not have becns Cuptain-General, as wilt appear from thg

CAPTAIN GILL., commanding His Majesty's sloop "Sparrowhawk," arrived in this port on the 17 th instant, and 1 have now the honour to transmit, herewith, to your Lordship, a copy of this Officer's amended declaration, of the detention of the Spanish slave-schooner "Sirntiago," an abstaact of his evidenee with respect to her crew, whom ho landed at Santiago de Cuba, and also a translation of the final sentence of the Mixed Commission, emancipating the 105 slaves, delivered ap to the Captain-General, by Captain Parker, of His Majesty"s sloop "Slaney.

It appears from the papers of the "Santiango," and the evidence of her Master, that armed with 8 muskets and 12 swords, she sailed from Santiago de Cuba with 15 men , ineluding the Captain, on the 10th of August last, and that having embarked 144 slaves at a place, according to the Master, ealled Bras, on the Calabar Coast, she left Africa on the gth of Febrnary last.
The Court has ndjudged the detention of the "Santiage" to be legal, without the Captor having prodscod that minimum number of the individuals of her erew, which the 3 d Article of the Regulations annexed to the Treaty, requires the Commissioners to examine. While they overlook this difficulty in the present case, the Spanish Commissioners have felt themselves bound to state to me, that they hopesuch mistakes will be avoided in future. And, indeed, I am convinced, that one of the most eflectual modes of cheeking this detestable traffick, is for His Majesty's Officers to lodge the erews of the slavetraders in the common prison of the Havana. It may be trae that they are not punished there as they deserve, but still they are imprisoned for a time, and hithertn, have in general been dralted by Admiral Laborde into his ships-of-war. In my opinion, the trade ought to be rondered both dangerons and irksome, in order to inspire a salutary dread of it, in the minds of the common sailors, a class of men, who, from slave-tradert, pass readily into pirates, and who clearly suffer little by the cmancipation of the slaves, they are employed to convey from Africe.

ON the 1st instant, the schooner "Primera Galle ejn," D, Antonio Musar, Master, and on the 13th, the schooner "Primera," D. Gabriel Perez, Master, sailed from this port, both for the Coast of Africa.

On the 8th iustant, the brig "Catalana," D. Jayme Ricoma, came into this port, in ballast, after having landed a cargo of slaves on the coast. She was fitted out at Barcelona, I understand, and it is lamentable to perecive, that, while the traffick has very visibly decreased from the Havana, during the last 6 months, it appears to get more vigorous from the mother eountry, In the case of the "Catalanu," IT have received the customary form of answer from the Captain-General, who informs me, moreover, that on the examination of her papers, by the Comandante de Matriculas, the certificate of a British Officer was found among them, stating that on visiting her, he found nothing on board to justify her detention.

I have some reason to believe the traffick to be more active on the more distant parts of the South Coast of this Island, and Licutenant Tulloh, of His Majesty's schooner "Pincher," acquaints me, that in those more remote places, hie has seen several instances of slave-vessels escaping, by the stratagem of transhippiug their negroes on board coasting vessels, provided with passports from the Local Authorities, and so landing them under the protection of the 7 th Article of the Instructions annexed to the Treaty. I anticipate, however, considerable decrease in the slave-trade soon, from the great fall that has taken place lately in the value of Colonial produce.

Still, as the Mixed Commission did not stand in any need of their evidence, I considered the present to be a fair opportunity of urging the right of His Majesty's Naval Officers to detain such British subjects as they may have discovered to bo engaged in this illicit traffick under the Spanish flag. The Spanish Commissioners wrote on the 26 th ultimo to the Captain-General, urging lis Excellency to demand these men, as in the case of the "Sontiage," formerly condemned, but, whether, from the arguments upon which they grounded their opinion not being considered very valid, or from some other cause, the Giovernor has addressed no letter to me on the subject, and I have heard no more about it. On the 29th the "Victor" sailed with the 2 men on board.

I beg leave to enclose a translation of the letter, which the Spanish Coramissioners addressed, on this subject, to the Captain-General.

I HAVE the honour to acknowledge the receipt of your Lordship's despatch, dated the 24 th of April last, transmitting, for the information of His Majesty's Commissioners, and for any observations which they may have to submit thereupon to the consideration of their Government, copies of a despateh, and of its enclosares, from His Majesty's Envoy at Madrid, by which it appears, that the Sjanish Goverument has refused to aceede to the conclusion of an Article, declaring ships, obviously fitted up for the slave-trade, to be thereby subject to condemnation, but, at the same time, has issued a Koyal Ovder, enjoining a rigorous wbservation in future, of the stipulations of the Treaty of 1817, to the Gaptains-General of Cuba and Puerto Rica. The above refusal of the Spanish Goverument I learn with extreme regret, because, white it is particularly painful to be obliged to submit any observations to your Lordship's consideration, that would imply doubts to exist in my mind as to the sincerity of Spain in issuing the new order, I cannot blind myself to ohvious facts. By this decree the Treaty is once again directed to be scrupulously ohserved, but without the least enquiry into the cause of the Spanish laws, on the same subject, having been so long inefficacions, or the least censure on those, whose daty it was to have carried them into effert. I cannot, therefore, but agree with IIis Majesty's Envoy at Madrid, in entertaining doubts of the efficacy of any such Royal Order, after what has notorionsly taken place under decrees of nearly the same tenour. Indeed, I conceive myselt justified in even going farther, and in stating, that its ineflicacy is demonstrated by the following simple facts. This Roya! Order was issued on the 4th March last. Another Royal Order, dated the 8 th of the same month, was published here in the "Diario," on the 15 th May, so that we may fairly presume the preceding Royal Order, to have been in the hands of the Havana Authoritics about the same time. Now, since the 1sthi May last, 8 vessels, as will appear by the enelosed list, have entered the Port of the Havana, after landing their cargoes of slaves, and whent is still more distressing. 6 have sailed for the Coast of Africa, 3 of them publickly, and 1 (an Ameriean brig) cleared out so lately as yesterday. Whatever objections Npain may entertain to exposing her sailors, implicated in this traffick, to the penalties of piracy, whatever arguments she may have diseovered, to support her refusal to subject vessels fitted up for the slave-trade to condemnation, I must confess, it she be sincere in her declared wish to repress this nefarious species of commerce, that it is impossible for me to understand, how she should * till permit vessels, notoriously fitted up for the slave-trade, to sail publiekly for the Coast of Africa, from the Havana, with Government Passports, and often under convoy. Nay this is, it possible, still more inconceivable, whea we may, in filrness, conelude, that the Captain-General ought, Iong since, to have furnished lix Government, with those lists of vessels cleared out for the Coast of Atrica, which were required of him by the Royal Order of 30th June 1828.

cuting the Cedula of December, 1817 , and the Royal Order of 2d January, 1826, and merely confines itself to requiring a punctual observance of the Treaty, without specifying in what particular respect this has been already infringed. It may bo necessary to state to your Lordship, that there is an erroneous idea too prevalent in the Havana, that the stipulations of the Treaty are complicd with, when the Nixed Commission is allowed the fall exercise of its duties, with regard to vessels captured by His Majesty's cruizers; and my experience of the Spanish mode of interpreting Royal Orders, serves to convince me, that the above omission of any mention of the former Spanish lass on the subject of the slave-trade, would render this Royal Order a nullity, even if it ever came into the hands of the CoptainGeneral. The truth is, that those Spanish laws were made to gire full effice to the Treaty, and it is of the direct or indirect breach of those laws that His Majesty's Guvernarent linve most to complain. I must, therefore, declare, that, instead of this new Royal Ordor being, as Mr. Salmon declares, energetic, it is, in my humble opiaion, esen more fecble than the many preceding ones on the same subject. Nearly 12 years have been allowed to elapse, in open eontempt of the King's Orders, and still blame is attached no where; decree after decree has been made, and cluded, and at this sery fate period, the Treaty is merely direeted to be observed, while not the slightest precaution is taken to amend the notorious inefficiency of the present state of the Spanish law. When I venture to make nse of the words "t notorious inelficiency," I mean, in the cyes of the Havana Authoritics, for 1 am bound to believe, that the Spanish Tribumals really deem these laws to be faylty, or they would never have allowed every vessel, denounced to them by His Majesty's Commissioners, to have escaped punishment.
But there is still another remark, which it is my duty here to make lumbly to your Lordship. The Royal Orders of 30 th June, 1828 , and of tth March, 1830 , the 2 latest on the slave-trade, have never yot been published in the Havan. Why should these decrees alone not be promulgated? They not only have never appeared in the "Diario," as I cammet but think thry would have done, had they related to any other subject, but I have never huard their existence mentioncl in any society. They might as well, therefore, as far as the Havana is concerned, have never been issted. The first of them involved a strong censure of an Auditor-ot-War, and therefore reasons may be imogined for its having been suppressed from the knowledge of the publick, but this last Royal Order is hable to no such objection, and merely requires a seropulous observance of the Treaty. Now, I will venture to express my frm conviction, that no Royal Order on the subject of the slavetrade, supposing it to have been received from Madrid, can ever have any the slightest efficacy in the Havans, unless it be made publickly known in the official organ of the Local Government. Certain laws liave lieen, for years, hitherto eluded, or at least not carried into execation, surely then, it is necessary, and barely just, to inform the publick, that these laws are hencelorward to be rigorously exeeated, if such be really the intention. It appears even more necessary, when we reflect that the slave-traders, as 1 have before had the honour of stating to your Lordship, imagine themselres to be protected by their Government.
Ihave mentioned above, that 6 vessels heve suiled from this port for Afrient, sinee the 15th of May last, and it may possibly be urged that, compared with the 2 preceding years, this is a very small number, and argues some disposition in the Lucal Authorities to repress the traffick. But the lase is as cicarly made useless, if one publick departure for the African Const be allowed as if 20 licences were given, and 1 ann sorry to state, that the diminution of the number of departures this year is to be attributed, not in any degree to preventive measures, on the part of the Spanish Goverament, bat soldy to the preseat very distressed state of colonial agricultore, and to the heavy losses which some of the slave-traders have experienced by captures.

ON the 3d instant, arrived in this port, after landing a cargo of slaves, the schooner " Indogader"," D. Juan Joze Rodrignez, Master. 1 reported her to the Captain-General immediately on her arrival, but his Excellency has returned me the usual form of answer.

On the ath instant arrived the brig " Negrito," D. Antonio Malbar, Master; and on the 9th, the brig "Servaude," alias "Gallo," D. Franciseo Saenz, Master. Neither of these vessels were reported to the Captain-Goneral, because, the first having entered us from the Cape de Verde Islands, and not having been fitted out from the Havana, I did not learn that she had landed slaves on the coast, until some days after her arrival in port, and when it was too late to expect any inventigation. The "Servamm" was not denounced, becatwe, although a noted slave-trader, she left the Coast of A frica without slaves, the Master's story being, that, after he had waited for many
weeks quarre 8el to On schoon 16th i for thi vessel, Zangr
weeks at the place to which he was dispatched, the natives, owing to some quarrel, rose and massaered the whole of the factory, obliging this slave-vensel to return withont a cargo.

On the 1oth instont, sailed for the Island of St. Thomas, the Spanish schooner "Dos Amigos," D. Jozé Rumon Mujica, Master: and on thes 1 Gth instant, the American brig ". Lyon," J. Mackenzie, Master, cleared out for the Coast of Africa. I beg to call your Iordship's attention to this last vessel, which has been publickly elearcal out for the Coast of Atrica, by Messrs. I AM communded by the Lards Commissioners of His: Mujesty's Treanary to ampaint you, for the information of the Earl of Abendeen, that thay have bad ander consiflention pour ferter inf the 10th of July last, on thesulfject of the detention of the Spartish vessel " Santiuso," on a charge of haviog been conecened in Illegal slave-trades and the attention of their Lomithiph hiving bevn direeted to the question, which involves the national chanseress of Ribet, the Master, and Joarnée, a bluch sailor belonging to that vescl, it appears to my Lords, that the circumatances of nuspicion attueling to the Master are, that hie confessed, while ou boord His Majesty's ship " Slaneg, that he was as native of Malsa, and it is represented that his Italiun pronumention, and ulmost atter ignonace of the Spaniah language, tended to confirm that confession. It however appears, hy his exawinution on oath before the Mixeal Connission Conrts, that he was a native of Birceclonn, and an resident of Leghorn. Under these circumstances, there being no furthor evidetice, it nccans inpossible to nseertain the truth, and though it is most desimbic to onforce the haw maime lhitish subjerts erygaged in the slave-trale, yet my Lords are of opininh, that, in the prewnt instance, there es not atficient proof to pet thus individual on his trial, and, therefore, that it would not be advisable to give any directions with regard to thin person.

With regard to the nutionul charactur of Alexander Journón, the ochar individual who was sent to Hivath, the nuspiceon which attaches to his bcing a British subject, appears to be somewhat struager.
- The facts stated certuinly maise as stiong suspicion, bat do not, in the opinion of wy Lonls, mount ko that degree of proaf, which would be deemsol requisite to erisure a suecessful result to wprosecuition, and consillering the expense incidental to bringive this persen to trial, und the iummalabiliey of obraining evilence to prosecute to a cinsiction, my Lends do not consider it to be necearity to give atry direetions wifl repect io this pernot idso.
My Lords observe, that the Commissary Judge, in lis letter of 7 th May, requests to bo farnishet with directious on the following points, via:

Ist. - Whether a frank confession, made to the Mixed Conmission by any Britiah sailor who may be taken its a Spanish slave-yence, and which tends to her condemation, gives bime a clain to favourable consileration on the part of His Shjesy's Commisaioners.
9d.- Whether His Majesty; Comuishionert, or Naval Officos, ure justified in refusing to deliver up to thic Local Gionermment, a person whom they may belicve to be a British saljict, and whout they may know to have berri captured on board a \(S\) pansh slave-vescel,
Sd. - As to the particular test, by which His. Majesty's Conmissioners ought to determine a muat to be a Britinh sabject, who declares a false purac and birth-place, or makes a fabocentry in the trasereroll of a slave-vissel, a plan without dowht which all Englishmer engaged in thin nefarious traffick, will adopt, is soon in the affire of the "Midat" shatl be made more publick. My Lords ate of opinion, that it is impossifile to give any conclmive asswers to these quentions, of to fumith the Commissary Judye with any prectie and definito instractions on this subjoct. In the prosent state of the law, in order to convict any person eaggaged in the alave-trade, out of His Majenty's dominions, it is necessary to establish, by evidence, that the individual prosecuted is a British subject; it verv fregnently happens, perhays in a majority of cises, that mational chanieter is moxt diffictilt of proal, and it is certinaly imposible to foretell what specific proof will be requixite in any partientar ease, to ensure a comviction. The admission of the individual, that he is a British subjoct, and the making of false entries, we-circumstancei only, whidh, In conjunetion with other fates, may-make suth is case, or would induce \(a\) jary to find ihat the person prosecuted was is Dritinle sulbject, and consegueatly guilty of the offence ctarged. It appears to my Londs, that the only directions which cun he siven to any. Britioh Authorities, likely to mect with cases of this kind, are, that they should, in every cove where il pernom foutud enguged in the ntwe trade, is cuspected of being i British subjeet, exerine their hest judgnent and discretion in deternining whether there is sufficient prital fundin evidenee to prove that the inatividual is a Britith muhiect. If the cirmastance warraut on affirnitive conclusion, my Lorde conccive that the offenter stonlht be detained, and sent by the first oppartunity to the most coavenient parn of the Britiah dommions, with a full stateaient of all the facts, and the evidence which ean be addneed, that His Mniestr's Law Advisers may then deternitic whecther a proscaition should be commenced or not. My Loris are Mell aware, that in this, or in ming other cyurng, there may be many diffcultics, but they are deriderlfy of opinies, that some meavires should be adopted to prevent, on the one hand, the mishief of ineflectund prosecutions, and on the ather, the very serious evil of the otfence becosning mare frequent by fulpuity.

the Aimiralty, to Mir. Backhouse, on the subject of the 5 men captured on baad the "Midas," together with its cuclosture, being a copy of the Report of the Solicitor of the Adminaliy on the same subject.
I observe the opinion of the latter genteman to be, that the muster-roll of the "Midas" carnot be matle legal cridence, to shew of what coumtrics the 5 unen in queatian are natives, without additional proof, that the entries relating to those indiviluals were made with their privity, or from represomtations they had given of themeelves, I confess my mability to meet this ebigetion as it is not to be supposed that any person in the Havana will come forward to give evidence against persons concerned in the slave-trade. But although 1 have ever suspected the existence of the difficulty now brought forwand by the Solicitor of the Adniralty, I thonght it my duty, in a case of such urgent importance, to forsard to Eagland the beat evidence in my poreer, which was a certified copy of the muster-roll.

I have every rcason to believe, from Lieutenant Sherer's commenications to me, that these men, or at least a part of them, did admit to that gentleman, that they were British suhjects; but of course this fact can be best established in Englind, where Lientenant sherer now is.
In consequence of the dificulties which occurred in bringing these 5 prisoners to trial at Jamaica, and at St. Christopher's, they were brought back to this port in the month of April last, being then on their way to Enghand, on bourd His Majesty's ship "Barham," bearing the flag of the Vice-Admiral, the Hon. C. E. Fleeming. I have, ken.

I have also the honour to inform your Lordalip, that on the same day, the Spanish brig "Vengador," D. Agustin Capera, arrived in the harbour, after having landed on the coast about 600 slaves. The answer I have just received from the Captain-Gieneral on the subject of this brig, is exactly similar to that which bis Exeellency made me lost year, when I denounced the same vessel for having then landed 586 slaves, as mentioned in my despateh of 3d September 1829.
I am sorry to have likewise to state, that the Spanish ship "Monteruma" sailed to-day for the Coast of Africa. She was formerly the notorious "Nueva Dinne," alins "Fome de Cadis," to which your Lord-hip's attention has been so often drawn, as well by His Majesty's Chargé d'Aftaires at Madrid, as by His Majesty's Commissioners at the Havana. She mounts 24 guns, and is commanded by D. Jozé Villanova.

WE have the honour to inform your Lordship, that the barque "Elisa," under Brazilian colours, with 319 slaves, and the brig "Africone Oriental," alias "Frlix Mariaura," under Portuguese colours, with 376 slaves, embarked in the Ports of Mosambique, arrived here on the Gth instant.

The Brazilian Government ordered the Judge of Contraband to proceed against these vessels; but the Owner of the "Eliza," who is also the Consignee of the "Africano Orieutal", availed himself of the sth Article of the Alvara of 1818 , to bring both cases before the Mixed Conemission for adjudication; his petition to this purport is dated the 14th instant.

These eases do not come within the purvicw of the printed regulations for the guidance of the Mixed Commission, which contemplate a captor, or a prosecutor, whose duty it would be diligently to adduce evidence of illegal traffick; we are, therefore, obliged to act under circumstanecs requiring more than ordinary circumspection.
We enelose copy of a letter, which Mr. Aeting Commissary Pennell deemed it expedient to address to His Majesty's Chargé d'Affaires, with regard to the proliminary steps taken in this busimens, and the progress of which will command our anxions attention, with a view to the just discharge of our efficial functions. We regard the conduct of this Giovernment touching these yessels, ns affording evidence of its boza fide intention to respect the Stipulations of the Abolition Treaty.

Foreign Offec, June 28, 1830.
I SUBMITTED, for the opinion of His Majesty's Advocate-General, your despateh of the 20th July, 1829, relating to the refisal, which has been returned to ari application, which yon had made to the Local Authorities at Surinam, for information touching the state of the negroes, in respect to whom sentence of emancipation has been decreed by the Court of Mixed Commisson, of which you were members; and I have to acquaint you, that the King's Adrocate has given it as his opinion, that the Judges of the Mixed Commission Courts, established under the provisions of the Treaty with the Netherlands, for the abolition of the slave-trade, have not authority, as such, officially to interfere with respect to the treatment of the negroee, who, in conformity with the 6ith Article of the Regulations for the cstablishment of those Courts, shall have been delivered over to the Government, for the purpose of bcing employed as free labourers.
The functions of the Commissioners are merely of a judicial nature, and naturally ccase, when the sentence, decreeing the emancipation of the negroes, has been carried into effeet by the delivery of them to the Govern-
ment.
The question, how far the stipulations of the Treaty, by which each Government binds itself to guarantec the liberty of sueh portions of the indi viduals, as shall be respeetively consigned to it are fulfilled, is, in the opinion of the King's Advocate, matter for communication and explanation butween tiwo Governments.
The King's Advocate is, therefore, of opinion, that if His Majesty's Commissioners at Surinam shall have received any information, upon which they think they can rely, that the provisions of the Treaty have not been obs servod, with respect to the emancipated negroes in that colony, it will be their daty to communicate it to His Majesty's Goyerament, for the purpose of enabling them to demand the vecessary explanations from the Government of the Netherlands ; but that the Commissioners are not entitled to require "that the Governor-General should communicate to them the present numbers and conditions, and the mode of treatment adopted towards the negroes by those persons, under whose charge they are, in order that they may the transmit the same to their Government."

I have instracted His Mijesty's Ambassador at the Court of the King of the Netherlands to request, from the Government of the Netherlands, the required information, and I will communicate to you the result of the enquiry.

been attended to by the Netherlands Government at home, and that we are now never without one, and frequently with 3 men-ot-war in the harbour.

We enclose, for your Lordship's perusal, a list of the ships-of-war which have arrived here, or departed hence, from the 1st of May, 1829, to the last of June of the present year, with the times of their arrival and sailing, and the period they have remained at this port.

With respect to the last point, we beg to call your Lordship's attention to a circumstanee, of which we feel doubtful of our competeuce to take notice to the Colonial Govermment here. From the time of the arrival to the time of the departure of any ship-of-war, it appears a settled rule for her never to take a cruize, and there is only one instance to the contrary, since we have been in the colouy, (the "Panther," Captain Buys), which took a cruize of 16 days to Cayenne last year.

This iuactivity, on the part of the naval force, must give ample opportunitgies to the introduction of African slaves, and the escape of the vessel afterwards; and we are induced to make the above circumstances known to your Lordalip, from a report that was in circulation, a short time ago, of a slavetrader being off this coast. We had not sufficient evidence of the fiet, nor had we the means of procuring it, or of ascertaining if a landing actually took phace, so as to enable us to make an application to the Governor ; but if one of tie men-of-war, then lying in the river, had been cruizing off the coast, there would then have been no difficulty in arriving at the truth or falsehood of such a report.

With the execption of the above report, we feel great satisfaction in having it in our power to inform your Lordship, that it is our firm beliel, that not a single instance of illicit importation of negroes has taken place, sinee we have been in the colony.

\section*{My Lord,}

Striviatin, Sept 14, 1830.
WE have the bonour to acknowledge the receipt of your Lordship's despatch of the 28 th of June, 1830, informing us of the opinion of His Mujesty's Advocate-General on the subject of our despateh of last year, relating to the refusal which had been returned to an applieation, which we had made to the Local Authorities, for information touching the state of the negroes, on whom sentence of emancipation had been decreed by the Court of Mixed Commission in this colony.

We beg to lay before your Lordship the cause of our application to the Governor for that information.

Fur the last 5 or 6 years the Colonial Government has had under its eharge from 800 to 1,000 negroes, part of them emancipated by a decree of the Mixed Court, and most of the remainder the result of different seizures made by the Authorities here, since the abolition of the slave-trade, which last appeared to possess an ill-defined species of treedom, and the Government itself seemed to doubt whether they were free or slaves. About 3 years ago, at the suggestion, and by the advice, we believe, of General Van den Boseh, the Commissary-General of His Majesty the King of the Netherlands, it was thought proper to take a good number of these negroes, who were then dispersed about the colony at the different military posts, performing the duties of Officers' servants, or other light work, and to transport them to a river called the Sarramacea, about 8 hours distant from the town, and there to begin and establish a large sugar plantation on the account of the Government. As the work on sugar estates is more severe than any other labour in the colony, discontent soon arose among the negroes, and, from time to time, it has been found necessary to have recourse to just the same punishments as are inflicted on slaves, to keep them in a proper state of subordination. Conceiving that the negroes, who had been emancipated by sentence of the Mixed Court, had a right wo some different and better treatment than the above, we endeavoured all in our power to ascertain, if they formed part of the gang on the new sugar plantation; but, failing altogether to get any information we could rely on, we thought our best course was to address his Excellency the Governor, whose answer we transmitted to your Lordship; and it is so difficult to discover the truth of any thing here but what passes before our awn eyes, that wo are still unable to furnish your Lordship with any further information on the subject.
We, therefore, shall anxiously await the result of the enquiry, which, your Lordship informs us, you have instructed our Ambassador at thic Court of the King of the Netherlands to make, and which your Lordship has hindly undertaken to transmit to us.
